Massingill and Ayres returned from the Windy Hollow mines Tuesday and report fairly good headway being made on development work on some of the claims. There are between 25 and 30 prospectors there from different places, most all strangers, who are living in tents, and seem to be doing some thorough prospecting. It is sincerely hoped that these mines will prove equal to the statements sent out concerning them. The prospects are said to be good, and some fine specimens of gold-bearing rock have been taken from a number of the claims, and everyone hopes that development of the claims will establish absolute confidence in the district and furnish a basis for safe investment.

The experience of Multnomah county ought to be a valuable lesson to the other counties of the state in buying up lands for taxes at tax sales. The statutes provides that counties may buy up lands at tax sales, but must not be a competitive bidder for the lands, and deeds issued for such property must show on their face that no other bid was offered for the particular piece of property. It is estimated that the deeds for \$1,000,000 worth of property bought by Multnomah county for taxes are void because the fact that the county was not a competitive bidder was not stated on the face of the deed.

There is very little talk of war of late. The San Francisco delegation that visited Washington to discuss the question with the president had some difficulty in securing terms fully satisfactory to themselves and the people whom they represented, who kept the wires hot with telegrams urging a bold stand, but they were reasonable men and knew the president could not positively promise them what they asked for. Japanese exclusion is the real solution of the matter, and when congress will grant that, other questions will be easily settled.

Stockmen Take Notice.
All persons desiring to graze their stock within the Fremont and Goose Lake Forest Reserves during the season of 1907, are requested to make application for this privilege and secure a permit from the Supervisor before entering or crossing reserve lands. The regular application blanks for grazing permits can be secured by writing the undersigned, at Lakeview Oregon. Applications for grazing in the Goose Lake Forest Reserve should be on file in this office not later than March 7th, 1907. All persons desiring to use the Fremont Forest Reserve, which is the territory north of the township line between townships 30 and 31 south, should submit their applications not later than March 20th, 1907.

A general stockmeeting will be held in Lakeview March 7th and 8th. The object of the meeting will be to make grazing allotments and to decide on definite divisions between cattle and horse districts, and sheep range. Similar meetings will be held at Paisley, Oregon, on March 15, and at Silver Lake, Oregon, March 20, for the convenience of residents living near these places.

All sections of the country adjacent to the reserve should be well represented, so that a fair and equitable adjustment of the range may be secured, therefore, all stockmen depending on the Forest Reserve for grazing, are urged to attend one of these meetings.
