Oregon's Severe School Laws.

That Oregon now has upon its statute roll a law for the punishment of children the "most severe in the United States," is not a fact of which we can feel proud.

Absenteeism in the public schools is an evil, but the people have never accustomed themselves to the thought of imprisoning children for that cause, and if today, an attempt should be made in Lakeview to put a child in prison for truancy, it would FAIL. How can it be possible that the children of parents who are freely taxing themselves, in the counties, beyond the requirements of the law, and are voting additional district taxes for better houses, more modern equipments, and for longer terms of school, can be absenting themselves from the schools to such an extent as to suggest the propriety of so harsh a penalty?

Public schools have not been forced upon the people against their wishes. They have themselves paid the cost of general provisions for public education, and have freely taxed themselves locally to supplement the general school fund, and they resent the imputation which this statute makes against them. Every fact accumulated in four hundred years' experiment in milder means of government of children declares against the wisdom of this law. The people will never enforce it here, or see it enforced.

Tampered With Witnesses.

The prosecution in the Hermann trial charges Mr. Gately, Hermann's attorney and son-in-law, with tampering with the government witnesses. When Sorenson, one of the convicted Oregon land thieves, arrived at Washington to testify against Hegmann, Gately met him and had a long conversation in Sorenson's room, giving the witness his house number and telephone number. Evidence is being brought out showing that the Blue Mountain forest reserve was created, or a large portion of it, for the benefit of parties who were intending to rob the government of valuable timber lands. Sorenson testified that he used a letter from Hermann to P. P. Mays of Portland, for the purpose of inducing people to buy land in the country that was to be included in the reserve, as stated in the letter. Mays is alleged to have told Sorenson, "We will all get a tip from Washington as soon as the Blue Mountain reserve is created." Sorenson also testified that he had promised Mitchell \$500 if he would have the Cascade reserve extension made, and Mitchell wrote that he would confer with Hermann then commissioner of the general land office, and later advised Sorenson how to proceed. Sorenson said he paid this \$500 debt by working for Mitchell's election to the U. S. senate.

Timber land is not the only kind of land that is being sought after by the land grabbers. According to a statement from Harney county, vast areas are being hogged up under the desert land law, and thousands of acres are falling into the hands of the people who do not comply with the law. The report states that in many cases settlers locate on a desert and a homestead claim at the same time, the land adjoining, swearing that one is agricultural and the other desert upon which crops cannot be grown without water. Instances are sighted where desert claims have been taken up bordering a stream, where little effort was required to turn the water onto the land.

The Nevada legislature has passed a joint resolution asking for the annexation to Nevada that portion of California lying east of the summit of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, comprising Modoc, Lassen, Alpine, Mono and Inyo counties.

Floods have been raging in nearly all the eastern states, and serious damage has resulted. The little freshets we have here are damp spells compared with the eastern floods.

Indian Arrow Heads.

That Indian arrow heads, found in large numbers all over the western plains, are not the points made for the arrows of the American Indians and that the mounds, commonly accepted as the work of the red men, were made by another race, which lived before the American Indians, is the declaration of Dr. Chas. Eastman, the educated Sioux Indian, who is now re-naming the members of the Sioux nation. Dr. Eastman is one of the most distinguished of Indian students. He scoffs the idea that the American Indians originated the flint-pointed arrow or the granite and flint battle clubs and the tomahawks, and believes most of the arrow heads found throughout the west were made by the race which roamed the hunting grounds before the Indians came to take possession of them. He has lived all his life, and is now a man of 40 years, as a wild Indian on the reservation of the Dakotas, and he says he never has known an Indian who could make an arrow head, or ever knew of one being made, or who knew anything of the origin of the flint points.—Field and Farm.

Foresters at Paisley.

The meeting at Paisley passed off smoothly, and all applicants for range were satisfied. The part of the reserve handled from Paisley was from the township line between 30 and 31, and about 15 applicants for range were present. The meeting was managed the same as was the one held at Lakeview the week before.

Guy Ingram, of the Forest service, returned from Paisley, where he, in company with Inspector Erickson, went to hold a stockmen's meeting on the 15th. Mr. Erickson will proceed to Silver Lake, where he will hold a meeting of the stockmen of that section, after which he will go on up into the northern reserves to make a tour of inspection. Mr. Erickson will be absent from Lakeview until about the first of April, during which time the Lakeview office will be in the hands of Mr. Ingram and Mr. R. F. Hammett.

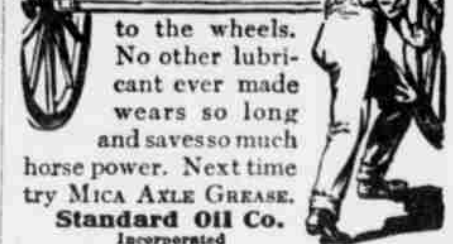
