Must Serve Sentence.

It looks now like J. N. Williamson, ex-congressman, Dr. Van Gesner and Marion Biggs, of Prineville, would have to serve the sentences meted out to them by the federal courts as a result of their trial on the land fraud cases. Van Gesner and Biggs have met with an adverse ruling from the circuit court of appeals sitting in San Francisco, and Williamson's appeal to the United States Supreme court is shadowed by the decision just rendered. Williamson's sentence is 10 months in the Federal prison and \$500 fine. Biggs received the same terms and Van Gesner was given 5 months in prison and \$1000 fine. They have one more chance in the supreme court, but it is thought that nothing more than delay of execution of the sentences will result.

Dutch lunch at the Brewery Saloon.

The local land office of this place is in receipt of instructions from the general land office at Washington, D. C., as follows: "You are directed not to receive proofs, affidavits or oaths of any kind what-so-ever, required to be made by applicants and entrymen under the homestead, pre-emption, timber culture, desert land and timber and stone, executed and sworn to after May 1, 1907, before deputy clerks of courts." This order precludes all deputy clerks from taking oath of entrymen.

Copies of Judge H. L. Benson's decision in the cases of the Warner Valley settlers and the Warner Valley Livestock Co. were filed in the clerk's office on the 16th of this month. Sunday was the "17th of Ireland," or, in other words, "St. Patrick's day in the mornin'."

St. Patrick's day is commemorated in honor of the Patron Saint of Ireland. While St. Patrick himself was not Irish, he brought to the Irish people, blessings galore, spreading the gospel among them, and is said to have freed them from the terrible pest of snakes and frogs, which would naturally abound in an island, which is famous for its verdure, the year round.

St. Patrick was born about the year 377, birthplace, Nenthur, some say the present Boulogne-sur-Mer. His father was named Calpurnius; his mother, Conches, or Conchessa; his original name was said to have been Succat, Patricius being the Roman appellation by which he was known.

He founded, in Ireland, 365, churches, and baptised with his own hand, 12,000 people. He lived a life of interesting adventure, to the ripe old age of 126 years.
