Races Commence on Monday, July 1st.

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give five days' racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 1st, and ending July 6th, 1907. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses, as follows:

FIRST DAY—July 1st.
 First Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash, purse \$125
 Second Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash " \$150

SECOND DAY—July 2nd.
 Third Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash, " \$125
 Fourth Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash, " \$175

THIRD DAY—July 3rd.
 Fifth Race— $\frac{3}{4}$ furlongs, dash " \$150
 Sixth Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash " \$200

FOURTH DAY—July 5th.
 Seventh Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash " \$125
 Eighth Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash " \$125

FIFTH DAY—July 6th.
 Ninth Race—1 mile and 94 ft. " \$200
 Tenth Race—Distance and Purse to be announced during the meeting.

CONDITIONS:
 All of the above Races are Free for All, four to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.

Entries to close the evening before the race, at 7 o'clock, sharp. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association to govern all races. Entrance fees, ten per cent. of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent. to the first horse and 30 per cent. to the second horse.
