Strike Affects Whole Country.

Farmers and fruitgrowers are becoming uneasy about the harvesting of their growing crops. They say the country has driven the Chinese and Japs out of the harvest field and are offering more wages in the cities than farmers can pay. The entire crop would not pay for the harvesting at such wages—and as a consequence laborers have flocked to the cities to work, leaving none to do the farm work. The strikes in the cities will sooner or later drive labor back to the fields. Everybody knows that 312 days work in a year at \$1.50 per day will buy more shoes and dresses than three times that wages in the city when men are out on strike two-thirds of the time and grafted by the unions for half they earn while at work, say nothing about the cost of living in the city where cottages rent for \$40 to \$60 per month, and water, coal, light and everything else the family need for their comfort cost a fortune. Just wait, farmers, you will get them back. Do as you did last year: let your wives and daughters help with the crop, save what you can and its all in the family.

Confession Without Restitution.

A contribution to the San Francisco Chronicle suggests that the confessions of the hoodlums of the city unaccompanied by restitution should not be considered. The Chronicle answers in the following language: "The 'Chronicle' has frequently declared that it is outrageous that the grafting supervisors should be permitted to retain their plunder, and has freely expressed the opinion that Reut should be compelled to disgorge. A confession of theft unaccompanied by a restoration of the thing stolen indicates neither repentance or a desire to make amends for past wickedness, and the maker of it therefore deserves no more consideration than the thief caught in the act."

The movement of the labor unions to establish competition on the street railways is the first indication of sense displayed by the carmen's union since the strike. This is the way the great body of citizenship of this country believe in. If the wages do not suit and you can get a better job or go into the business of organizing, all well and good; the country is open to competition but not ready for the dog in the manger policy in evidence in San Francisco. Don't work if you don't want to, but let the other fellow alone—Willows Journal.

The Alturas Plaindealer complains at the large timber land owners for having leased their lands to foreign sheepowners. The Plaindealer claims these bands of sheep drive cattlemen out of business and their owners pay no taxes in the county. These large land owners will rue their act, that paper says, as the time will come when land will have to be assessed at a higher rate to make up for the deficiency caused by the cattle moving out.

According to an act of congress of June 23, 1906, "No notary public shall be authorized to take acknowledgements, administer oaths, certify papers or perform any official acts in connection with matters in which he is counsel, attorney or agent, or in which he may be in any way interested before any of the departments aforesaid."

It is said that owing to the strike in San Francisco, the money market is light as a drum.

Klamath Falls and Lakeview, Ore.
