

Where Does the Blame Lie?

The sad accident that occurred over in Klamath county last week on the stage route from Pokemona, to Klamath Falls, related on the third page of this issue, in which the stage driver was killed and three or four passengers injured is to be deplored, indeed. Just where criticism would best fit in is a question, but that such incidents might and should be avoided seems plain. It is said that Mr. Gilbreath was an experienced stage driver and was capable of handling a team of four even on bad roads. Stage drivers, long in the service, are prone to grow reckless, we will not say careless, because an accident would endanger himself as much as any one else. But they grow to disregard the fears of passengers less accustomed to mountain roads, and even some of them take great pleasure in making "hair-breadth escapes" and "perilous drives," etc., much to the discomfort of their passengers. Whether or not this can be charged in the case at issue, we do not know. There are other causes that might have been responsible. Operators of stage lines, in their search of horses that can make good on the long, hard drives, are very apt to have imposed upon them some outlaw horses that are not safe anywhere. The disposition of a horse, if the animal be good otherwise, strong, willing and a "stayer" is seldom reckoned with when the contractor purchases horses to haul passengers over bad mountain roads. He usually says, "We'll take the snap out of him in a short time, when we get him strung out in a four-horse team on a long drive." Neither is the safety of the public reckoned with. The public is ignorant of the dangers they go through when taking passage over such stage lines. Then again; here is the matter of roads. The counties build the roads and reckon as little with the safety of the stage passengers or the convenience of contractors as the savage, outlaw stage horse reckons with fate when he takes a stampee down a steep mountain side, after he has taken advantage of the already perilous speed permitted by the driver.

Every person on board could as easily be hurled to death as he, half a dozen lives were at stake with as few chances as Mr. Gilbreath had. This poor man lost his life, as a result of the failure of some one to reckon; he is a sacrifice to, not carelessness, but thoughtlessness, a martyr to the cause of economy.

We received a letter from a party in Goldfield a few days ago, who wanted to subscribe for The Examiner. Three dollars was inclosed in the letter for a year's subscription, with the explanation that the extra dollar was to pay for stamps to put on the wrapper, as papers not stamped were used to kindle fires with and seldom delivered. Post masters who burn papers addressed to subscribers through their office should be roughly dealt with. There is considerable complaint from our subscribers about not getting their mail, and if they will give us a clew to where the papers are lost we will trace the matter up.

The indicted millionaires of San Francisco were required to give bail in amounts ranging around \$150,000 each. Mayor Schmitz' bail fixed on the various counts amounted to \$400,000.
