**The Significance of It.**  
The latest move in naval circles, that of ordering the Atlantic fighting fleet to the Pacific Coast, is significant in more than one feature. Aside from its real significance, it will demonstrate how unprepared the United States is for war. Notwithstanding the general belief outside of the war department that the United States is always ready for a conflict, the assembling of twenty-five or thirty battleships in Pacific waters will bring out the inadequacy of this Coast's preparedness to take care of a fighting fleet, to properly harbor and coal the fleet and maintain a supply point. Western coal fields are undeveloped, and at least six months would be required to open up sufficient coal mines to furnish the daily consumption. At least 60 days will be required to move our fleet from Atlantic to Pacific waters. Any other nation in the world, nearly, could reach the battle field as quickly as our navy. Our fleet is compelled to travel around South America in going from one side of the United States to the other, a distance of 14,000 miles from Hampton Roads, the Atlantic harbor to San Francisco, the only place on the Pacific Coast where a fleet of battleships could land, and the harbor there is wholly inadequate, from a supply standpoint. The transfer of our fleet from one coast to the other would leave the abandoned coast defenseless. How apparent is the need for two fleets.

We had the pleasure of seeing the finest growing crops ever seen in the valley between here and that place.
