**The Bishop's Visit Here.**

The Rt. Rev. C. J. O'Reilly, bishop of the diocese of Baker City, in company with Father Feusi, of Klamath Falls, spent the last week in Lakeview. In an interview with the correspondent of The Examiner, the bishop expressed himself as greatly pleased with the prosperity of Lakeview and other sections of Lake county. "The people only need a railroad connecting them with the outside world," said the bishop, "to develop this rich section of country. The town of Lakeview is steadily growing in wealth and population, and the future seems bright." The bishop informed us that he would purchase a site for a church in Lakeview, and that he hoped in the very near future to be able to begin the work of erection, and to place a resident priest in this town to attend the Catholics of this county. A fine brick building is contemplated.

"An effort will be made to make known to desirable homeseekers the many advantages of this section, especially its unsurpassed climate and good soil," said the bishop, "by our church."

The bishop delivered the oration here on the Fourth of July, one of the best that was ever delivered in this or any other town in Oregon and was warmly welcomed by the large concourse of people assisting at the celebration. Dr. E. Daly, county judge, presided at the exercises, and introduced Bishop O'Reilly in a neat and appropriate address.

The bishop believes that with a railroad, this will be one of the most prosperous sections of Eastern Oregon. Numerous homes are awaiting thousands of good citizens in Lake county, according to the opinion of the bishop, who hopes that a railroad will soon open up our valley to the settler.

The bishop's visit to Lakeview was greatly appreciated by our people, and we all hope for another in the near future.

A deal was made for the corner lot just north of the Masonic building, one of the most beautiful and valuable lots in the city, but on account of the owners being unable to give a clear and absolute title to the property, the deal had to be postponed. Three or four other lots were offered the bishop, but he had not yet decided what he would do when he and the priest left for Klamath Falls on Monday morning.

The lecture delivered by Bishop O'Reilly Sunday evening in the new Opera House, was largely attended and highly appreciated. The subject of the lecture was Catholicism and its teachings, and the bishop honored himself and the Catholic Church by the manner in which he handled the subject.
