Glanders in Shasta County.

That there is ground for fear of an epidemic of glanders in Shasta County is the belief of Dr. G. C. Taylor, a veterinary surgeon, says the Redding Searchlight.

The danger from such an epidemic may hardly be overestimated. The disease is not confined to horses. It is both contagious and infectious and the human race is not immune. There are many cases on record of human beings contracting the dread disease. There is no known cure for it, and no more frightful death can be imagined.

In the past few weeks Dr. Taylor killed a score or more horses suffering from glanders and there are cases now being watched.

The Limit of Life.
