The Silver Lake Leader.

A copy of the first issue of the Silver Lake Leader, the new publication launched at Silver Lake, in northern Lake county has reached our desk. The new paper, as The Examiner has stated before, is published by a company of influential business men of that town. The company has secured the valuable services of Wm. Holder, an old and experienced newspaper man to edit the paper. The first issue is well filled with news and neatly set-up advertisements. The Leader bids fair to become a power in the upbuilding of the county. We take for granted that the publishers are sincere in their announcement made in their salutatory that "The Leader at all times will stand for that which is right and honorable." We hope to see the Leader prosper and trust that the people of Silver Lake will realize the worth of it and give it the patronage it is entitled to and must have to do the work it is expected to do. There is plenty of work for the press in Lake county, and while the older established papers have stood with their shoulders to the wheel and done their work cheerfully, they do not expect to be relieved of any of their burdens by the advent of another paper, but expect the duties of the press to be increased to supply plenty of work for the new paper.

The new paper is Republican in politics. The Examiner welcomes the Leader to the field and a copy each week to our desk.

The president, no doubt, sees the seriousness of the situation, but only a very careful and thorough study of both sides of the question would justify his interference. Articles of incorporation have been filed for some time, it is said, but Mr. Cooke seems to have failed in getting the money to start the ball rolling. It is said that Modoc county is to have another Indian school. Modoc already has one Indian school, but because the Pitt River and the Piute Indians are not friendly another school is to be established near Lakeview. If these Indian schools do no other good they will have a tendency to maintain the warlike sentiments of the two tribes.

Klamath county boasts of the expected visit of Mr. Edward H. Harriman, the great railroad king. It is stated that the Southern Pacific Company has purchased a piece of property known as Pell-an Bay Lodge, which is at the head of one of the Klamath Lakes, and it is to see this property Mr. Harriman comes there.

The breaking of a 36 inch water main in Chicago a few days ago caused a panic. The stream of water, after bursting through the pavement shot 60 feet into the air, and in a few minutes the water in that portion of the city was four or five feet deep.

A blind merchant at Keno, in Klamath county, whose wife is also blind has received word from his wife from a hospital in Portland that a baby girl has been born to them. The baby can see all right.

Ashland Normal.

The State Normal School at Ashland is on a firm basis and its prospects are most flattering. The last legislature granted this institution the largest appropriation ever allowed a Normal School in the history of Oregon.

The school is at last permanently established. Four new teachers have been added, among them Mrs. Catherine Sloan of Portland, author of the Sloan Readers used last year in the schools of Portland. Cement sidewalks, large repairs on buildings, heavy additions of apparatus, new furniture, new rooms added to the dormitories with elegant furniture for all dormitory rooms, a complete system of sewerage and an abundance of water brought from the city of Ashland are among the improvements.

The School has a strong faculty of fifteen men and women all specialists in their lines. The graduates of this school are filling splendid positions and are in constant demand at from \$50 to \$110 per month. The health and moral conditions at Ashland are ideal for a school. Reports point to an enormously large attendance at the Ashland Normal next year.
