

> Community Breeding. Professor W. A. Henry of Wisconsin


in a recent address said: "The next great advance will be community effort. The farmers in each community should meet at the schoolhouse and harmoniously agree upon one breed of dairy cattle for that community. If the most blood in the dairy herds now is Holstein, they should all agree upon Holsteins and Holsteins only; if it is some other breed, then upon that breed. Where the farms are not large instead of having one scrub bull on each farm two, three or even four neighbors should join and buy one or two registered bulls. The scrub bull has no place on hundred dollar land."


