Journal's Anniversary.

The Portland, Oregon Daily Journal has entered its sixth year under the management and editorship of Mr. C. S. Jackson. Sunday, September 8, the Journal was five years old, and issued as a souvenir a 176 page paper, the largest daily newspaper that ever came to our desk. The first 67 pages was its regular Sunday edition, and accompanying it was a 100 page, 7 column supplement, printed on beautiful glazed book paper and handsomely bound. This supplement is the most elaborate piece of newspaper work we have ever seen. It is profusely illustrated with photographs of many hundreds of prominent buildings, scenes and people of Oregon. The work is magnificent, and the Journal is deserving of highest praise for its achievement. A brief writeup of each county in the state appears, and every county that furnished photographs of scenes and buildings are honored by their appearance in this handsome edition. Outside of the few misstatements made in the writeup of Lake county, we can say that this is the most complete, the handsomest, and the best piece of advertising the state of Oregon has ever had.

In the writeup of Lake county the statement is made that "the stand of timber is placed at 3,100,000 feet." This is far short. There are hundreds of 160 acre claims that will go that much and more. Some claims are estimated at over four million feet. It is estimated that three tenths of the county is covered with timber, which would mean many billions of feet. Again the statement is made that the United States Land Office is located at Silver Lake, while it is at Lakeview, the county seat.

The supplement sells at one dollar per copy.

Fifth Grade—Cyr's Fourth Reader, Smith's Practical Arithmetic, Natural Introductory Geography, Modern English Lessons, drawing and writing books No. 5, Reed's Word Lessons.

Sixth Grade—Cyr's Fifth Reader, Smith's Practical Arithmetic, Natural School Geography, Doub's U. S. History, writing and drawing books No. 7, Reed's Word Lessons, Modern English Grammar.

Seventh Grade—Cyr's Fifth Reader, Practical Arithmetic, Natural School Geography, Doub's U. S. History, writing and drawing books No. 7, Reed's Word Lessons, Modern English Grammar.

Eighth Grade—Smith's Practical Arithmetic, Doub's United States History, Reed's Word Lessons, Drawing book No. 8, writing book No. 7, Modern English Grammar.

Prices for the above books range from 10 cents exchange price to 25 cents retail, to 60 cents exchange price to \$1.15 retail. The exchange price of nearly all books is about half the regular price of the book.
