**Extremes in Headgear—Gold and Silver on Black Lace.**  
There is no doubt that headgear is getting bigger. In fact, it is assuming bewildering proportions in some instances. Big white and black lace hats are very becoming, especially when trimmed with a single feather. Little velvet bows are playing a most important part in the dressing up of the new gowns.

Black lace with gold thread or silver lines is handsome. A black lace waist with a bit of gold thread introduced on the cuffs or sleeve finishings and at the throat bears the mark of an artist's design.  
Among the colored veils worn are chenille spotted nets with lace borders. Coarse straw hats are charmingly softened by a veil held by two abnormally large hatpins.  
For shopping a brown tussore tailored skirt and coat are the accepted costume. The skirt is severely plain. The coat may be stitched with bands of the same material, and lace collars and cuffs complete it. A fancy coat is trimmed with strips of lace insertion or bands. A heavy rajah or tussore silk skirt is wearable on the golf or tennis field. The heavy pongees tub well and are much more serviceable than the linens.  
Ring dotted foulards are very stylish this season, and the dress seen in the cut is of foulard with a white ground and dots of a lovely shade of blue. The trimming is of plain blue silk embroidered in white dots bordered with narrow black velvet.

**Effects in Silk Ties—Millinery Concepts For the Modish.**  
The newest ties for linen collars are made of finely striped china silk. Green, mauve, gray and brown are to be seen in these concepts plaited into bunched rosettes or double butterfly bows.  
Large birds are used on hats arranged flat on the crown with spreading wings and head placed just forward at the front of the crown.  
A pretty hat of the Dolly Varden style is in natural hemp straw with a

square crown and a mushroom brim pinched down at each side and raised at the back. A fold of white glace ribbon round the crown is carried over the brim at the sides and tied at the back, and a wreath of small roses and buds across the crown hangs down on the hair at the right side. A small cluster of roses is placed on the bandeau at the back.  
Exaggerated bandeau and fantastically bent brims are passe. In their stead we have the drooping though rarely floppy brim. The prevalence of the mushroom hat is surprising, for after its introduction two years ago its presence was less noticeable in the succeeding season. But it now emerges triumphant.  
Soutache braiding in an elaborate vermicell pattern on a waist of plain net makes a smart bodice of materials themselves inexpensive.  
A favorite design on dresses of linen takes the form of trailing sprays of grapevines. The leaves in the narrow linen soutache are set on edgewise, and the grapes are built of big French dots done in heavy thread.  
Trimnings of silk bands are one of the fashionable effects of the season. The gown in the cut is adorned in this fashion. The fabric is marquette of a lovely shade of nut brown.
