The publisher said it was some one who did not like the policy of the paper, and he offers \$1000 dollars reward for his apprehension.

A complaint was filed by Ed Lake Monday against Charley Fong for maintaining a nuisance. Fong appeared before Recorder Snider and asked for time to consult an attorney and make a plea. The case will probably come up for trial today. J. D. Senator will represent Fong and City Attorney Thompson will appear for the City.

I. N. Converse. E. L. Fulton, a brother of C. W. Fulton, Oregon's Republican United States Senator, was elected congressman in Oklahoma at the election held on the 17th, on the Democratic ticket.

One hundred and two bids were received and opened by the State Land Board Monday, Sept. 1, for the purchase of 10,000 acres of indemnity school land situated in different parts of the state, at prices ranging from \$5 to \$35 per acre.

The Powers blacksmith shop in Alturas burned down last week. The local fire brigade succeeded in holding the fire to the one building, and while the loss fell quite heavily upon the owner of the shop no other damage was done.

Admiral Robly D. Evans who is to command the battleship fleet in Pacific waters has been given full say as to whether the fleet shall visit Portland. President Roosevelt is willing to leave the matter to Mr. Evans, and it is likely the fleet will go there.

As we go to press, we learn of the marriage of Miss Maud Woodcock, to Mr. Oscar Mathews, at Santa Rosa California. Miss Woodcock was once a Lakeview girl, is a sister of Mrs. Geo. Johnson, and her many friends here wish her an abundance of happiness. Mr. Mathews is manager of a hotel in Santa Rosa, where the young couple will reside.

The suit recently instituted by the State of Oregon against the Pacific Telephone company to compel the company to pay a State tax of 2 per cent on its gross earnings for the year 1906 is resisted by the company in an answer filed, the ground being that the initiative and referendum law, by means of which the tax law was put into existence, is unconstitutional.

Over \$9,000,000 has been added to the Reclamation Fund at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1907, making the amount of money available for irrigation purposes something over \$41,000,000. This is the largest sum added to the fund since 1903, Oregon contributed this year more than any other state as it has previously done, \$1,429,700. North Dakota is a close second, falling under Oregon's contribution about \$300,000.

The Examiner consolidated a couple of news items last week and gave a wrong impression. The items were: Elzie Linville has leased the South Lakeview stable, and Raymond Ballard has leased the A. S. Electric Power at Paisley.

C. W. Withers, the Summer Lake rancher and stockman, presented The Examiner office with a box of fine fruit Monday, raised in his orchard. There were several varieties of fruit: Apples, pears, plums, peaches and prunes, and all compare with the finest fruit raised anywhere. Mr. Withers informed us that his brother C. L., who is in Portland, would soon ship an electric power plant to Paisley to be installed on the Chewaucan river above Paisley. Power will be furnished for the new flour mill and also for lighting purposes for the town. A meeting will be called of the organizers of the flour mill company in a short time to determine upon plans. It is the intention now to put in a mill to cost between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

In remitting for another year's subscription to The Examiner, W. D. Duke, a cattle buyer, of San Francisco, writes as follows: "I appreciate your news regarding sales and movements of livestock, and trust that you will always keep that department of your paper up to its present standard."

Commissioner Ballinger, of the General Land office, will not allow the expedition of land cases on account of political pull. Heretofore many cases have been rushed through by claimants appealing to Senators and representatives. Mr. Ballinger believes it is unfair to the entryman who has no pull to permit the cases of those who have a pull to be put ahead. From now on cases will be considered in the order in which they are received.
