Surveyor-General Dead.

John D. Daly, Surveyor-General for Oregon, was found dead at the foot of the stairway in the entrance to the Selling-Hirsch building in Portland, at 4 o'clock on the morning of Oct. 4. His skull was fractured, and at first it was thought he had fallen down the stairs. Close investigation resulted in a different opinion as to the cause of death. No reason could be assigned to his being in that building at that hour in the morning, and the murder theory was advanced.

Daly was state Senator from Benton county three terms, and four years ago was appointed to the position of U. S. Surveyor-General for Oregon by President Roosevelt, to succeed Henry Meldrum, who was convicted of land fraud. Mr. Daly's term expired and in his pocket was found a telegram from senator Fulton notifying him that he would not be re-appointed. Daly was 63 years old, and leaves a daughter and one son. Mr. Daly founded a newspaper at Newport 20 years ago.

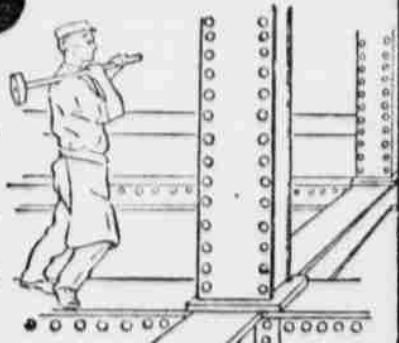
