There are to be no preferred creditors of the bank, the state and the city of Portland and the Ladd & Tilton Bank, who rushed in as soon as it was seen that the bank was in straits to secure the preferred securities of the bank, are to take the same chances as other creditors.

He informed us that the fittings for the dynamo had been ordered, and a new building was in course of construction at the old site of the electric plant, and as soon as the machinery arrived the plant would be in running order again. The proposed new Parcel Post law would naturally find opposition among country merchants all over the country, but if such a law is to be enacted at the next, or any other congress, Senator Fulton's amendment to the bill will render it less damaging to the country merchant. This amendment asks for a classified rate, based on the interstate character of the parcel to be shipped, which will make the rate less on parcels the shipment of which originates in the same state as the destination, thus protecting the interior merchant who has paid the freight on his goods from the East. Senator Fulton is in favor of a postal savings bank.

As a result of attacks made on Senator G. S. Nixon and George Wingfield through the columns of the Nevada Mining News, of Reno, George Wingfield knocked the editor of that journal down and threw him bodily out of a brokerage company's office in Reno one day last week. George entered the place on some business and the editor of the Nevada Mining News was there, and started to speak to Wingfield, but before the words were uttered George hit the fellow, knocking him down, and then grabbed him and threw him out of the office.

Mr. F. L. Wright, accompanied by Mr. J. J. O'Reilly, of Cobalt, Canada, arrived in Lakeview Monday. Mr. Wright owns mining property in the Pine Creek district, and Mr. O'Reilly is an experienced mining man who, it is said, has secured an option on some Windy Hollow mining property for a Pittsburg, Pa., company which will take up if his report is satisfactory. He is taking 150 pounds of ore from the Windy Hollow mines away with him to be tested and the results of the tests will decide the company in taking up the options.

The county court inspected the brick kiln last week, and while Stickle's contract was for the brick laid down in the court house yard this fall, it was decided to leave the brick in the kiln until spring, as they would toughen, and be the better for laying undisturbed through the winter. The brick will be put on the ground as early in the spring as work can be commenced on the new court house. The brick were pronounced the best that was ever made in the county.
