EVIDENCE IN THE CONTEST CASES.

(Continued From First Page.)

about sixteen months after entry was made; that all the improvements consisted of a shanty, with the gable ends both open; that the house was 10x12 feet in size, and not habitable; that it contained no furniture, had no floor, no place for stove nor stove pipe, and that there was no indication that the place had ever been occupied or inhabited by any one; that there was no water for use within a mile and a half in distance. He again saw the place on Jan. 12, 1907, and there was no changes; the cabin had some lumber inside and the floor was covered with snow. The tract is situated on an elevation of 6500 feet, and contains about two million feet of pine timber. In this contest is fully corroborated by his witnesses, Stewart, Yount and Cliff, who examined the tract. On the other hand, defendant states that he built the cabin between the first and fifteenth of November, 1905, and established residence in the middle of Nov. 1905, and has resided there ever since. Questioned as to particulars he says that his health has been such that he was compelled to expend all the earnings of his labor for medicines and doctor's bills; that he was on the land in May, 1906, in company with Hugo Meir and Carl Behr; that he was not well enough to make improvements; that he walked to the place from Silver Lake, a distance of sixteen miles, but had to be carried back by Meir. He says he was on the place about the middle of October, 1906; that he had bedding and provisions there, which he carried from his father's house; had no stove; that he had bought a stove but could get no one to carry it to his house, and that he cooked at a camp fire; that there was a lake and a spring on the land, from which he obtained water, and that he voted at Silver Lake; that it was his only home; that he had bought some lumber with which to floor the cabin, but it was not put in on account of his poor health; and that he consumes all his earnings in medicines and doctor bills. He always left his cooking utensils at his father's when he had to go away. He was in a hospital for three or four months. On cross examination he states that 12 days and perhaps more, constituted the entire time spent on the land. There was no cultivation, and none attempted. On the whole, the proof shows that defendant utterly failed to comply with the homestead law as to residence, cultivation and improvements. He says that he was unmarried, and that he understood that the law was more favorable to unmarried men than to those who were married, understanding that visits of about once in six months was all that was required of the former.

Decision of Lakeview office affirmed as stated last week.

Following is the most recent decision:

General Land Office, Washington, D. C., Nov. 18, 1907.

Roy G. Walker, vs. Carl Behr. H. E. Held for cancellation. Register affirmed.

Register and Receiver, Lakeview, Oregon.

With your letter of June 11, 1907, you transmitted the record of the above entitled contest on dissenting decision, the Register recommending the cancellation of homestead entry, made June 8, 1903, by Carl Behr, for the west half of east half of sec. 15, Tp. 30, south, R. 15 east, and the Re-

ceiver recommended the dismissal of the contest.

On November 23, 1906, Roy G. Walker filed contest affidavit against said entry alleging abandonment.

Pursuant to notice issued both parties appeared before you for hearing on January 30, 1907, and submitted testimony.

It appears from the testimony that the land is covered with a growth of pine timber, estimated at two million, two hundred thousand feet; that the land is located at an altitude of 6,500 feet; that the soil is poor and practically worthless for raising crops without water, and that there has been no cultivation of the land, and that only about an acre has been cleared and fenced.

Contestee is a single man, who worked as a laborer some distance from the claim, and that while he made several visits to the land he never actually resided thereon.

Three and one-half years had elapsed between date of entry and date of hearing, and during the duration of each of contestee's visits, all of them but one, being from two days to two weeks, the entire time he was on the land was seven months, or just one sixth of the whole time. No effort was made to make a living from the land, and contestee admits that he is unable to make a living there.

Under such circumstances it can be seen that contestee has not made the place his home nor does he expect to make it so in the future. Cultivation of the land, if not better adapted to grazing purposes, is as much of a requirement as residence, but practically no attempt at cultivation has been made.

Taking into consideration the great altitude, the poverty of the soil and the large quantity of timber, and it is fair to presume that the timber was the controlling motive in making the entry. It certainly has not been used as a home.

The decision of the Register is, therefore, affirmed and the entry is held for cancellation.

So note on your records. Advise the parties of this decision and contestee of his right of appeal to the department.

At the trial before the Register and Receiver L. F. Conn and J. D. Vantor represented Walker and J. M. Batchelder and Chas. Umbach represented Behr.

A decision was rendered recently in the local land office, in the case of C. L. Withers, contestant, vs. C. L. Dusenberry, Homesteader. The Register sustained the contest affidavit, while the Receiver sustained the homestead entry.

Ugly \$10 Price.

J. E. Enyart, president of the Medford National Bank, has received samples of the new \$10 gold piece now being coined by the mints, which has the words, "In God We Trust," omitted. The coin is probably the ugliest ever put out by the government. Certainly no coin collection reveals one so lacking in beauty. One side has an overgrown eagle that looks like a vulture wearing pantelettes. The reverse is a brutal looking Indian, not half as handsome as the conventional one on the one cent piece. Instead of being milled, the coin has a series of stars around the edge.—Tribune.
