**Mulkey Withdraws from Race.**

It is stated that Fred W. Mulkey, who some months ago, announced his candidacy for U. S. Senator, has withdrawn from the contest. The action of Mr. Mulkey leaves Senator Fulton in the field alone, so far as publicly announced candidates are concerned. Yet there are J. M. Calk, Joe Stanton, and, possibly others to come up later on.

Simply stating that he will be a candidate, Francis J. Hower, it is stated, recently made a political trip to Portland and advised that all but one candidate against Senator Fulton withdrew, thereby uniting the opposition to Mr. Fulton.

F. M. Calk has not announced his name, and it is probable, that the recent change of political tactics by the Oregonians, has staggered some of the aspirants for Senatorial honors, unless it be Governor Chamberlain. The action of Mr. Mulkey, in retiring from the contest, is something of a mystery to those who are not on the inside. It is more than likely that the Oregonian, in declining itself from the Republican Party, has put Mr. Mulkey in what he fears is a motley and vain. Whether Mr. Mulkey was assured of the support of the Oregonian, is not probably known to anyone except himself and Mr. Scott, but the recent stumping of the Oregonian, in its political affiliations, would lead one to believe that a republican will obtain the support of that paper for U. S. Senator. The Oregonian's peculiar infatuation for statement No. 1; repudiation of the republican party, and Governor Chamberlain's candidacy for U. S. Senator, are a singular coincidence.

**Are we Ready for Revolution?**

The Silver Lake Oregonian of December 29th perhaps believed it was controverting the position taken by the Lake County Examiner in an article treating of Parcels Post, but he was not.

When the Silver Lake editor admits that, the relation of the government to the country's transportation systems makes a "cheap Parcels Post an impossibility" he coincides, inadvertently no doubt, with what was clearly proven by the Examiner article, and all that was sought to be proven by it, that this country was not prepared for Parcels Post, and cannot, in its present relation to private property, operate Parcels Post advantageously, without assuming prerogatives and powers it has not heretofore exercised.

Here arises an entirely new question, at which the Silver Lake editor hints, but discreetly avoids, shall the government proceed to establish such conditions in this country as exist in Germany, government ownership of railroads? Are we ready for revolution? That is the question the Silver Lake Oregonian raises. If that paper is desirous of discussing it, it may. At present, we decline. We need light.

We regret to notice that the Silver Lake editor sneers at local retail merchants as "grafters."

The Silver Lake Leader cracks the first whip in the 1908 political campaign. It evidently believes that it is the "early bird that catches the worm." The Leader puts before the voters the name of E. K. Henderson for county commissioner. Mr. Henderson was a candidate for commissioner two years ago, and his defeat at the polls was certainly due to his not being qualified for the position. Our brethren of the south end of the county are certainly entitled to whatever office they want, and the south end will surely not object to their making their selection early.

An organization, known as the Civic Federation, has been perfected in Klamath Falls with a very large membership for the purpose of safeguarding the state, county and municipal laws in Klamath Falls in the regulation of saloons. The Sheriff has ordered the "id" down, as regards the gambling and the Sunday Closing laws.
