Visits New York Museum.

New York, Jan. 18, 1908.

Ed. Examiner:

In my last, too briefly described account of New York City's parks, I inadvertently failed to mention that the driveways in the large parks are raised considerable above the average level of the ground, and that they are practically all laid out in gentle curves, also forgot to mention that the large parks have several artificial lakes, making picturesque landscape, with the trees and small hills for a background.

I intended writing one communication concerning the menagerie, however, will say that if all the names of the different wild animals were written here they would make a long article themselves; suffice to say, there are several varieties of animals, which I had never seen before. The museum is situated just outside the Central park, on the west side, and is a free exhibit, like the menagerie inside the park. The building is beautifully designed, five stories high, 700 feet long and 80 feet wide, with a 200-foot "T". The material used in its construction is the best quality of stone.

Exhibits have been placed in the three lower stories, the arrangement of which I will try to describe, for that is about all that can be done in a short article:

When entering the center of the building fronting the "L", the first room has exhibits of all the meteorites found in the United States, and one from Greenland, this being the largest, weighing 36 tons, one from near Portland, Oregon, weighing 36,107 pounds, and many other smaller ones from different parts of the country. This room is 80 by 100 feet square. Here also the comparative size of the sun and other planets are shown. The sun is represented by a ball of about five inches in diameter, and the earth represented by a small hole, about the size of a small pin head, with a light spinning through. In an adjoining room is shown photographs of the heavenly bodies. The room to the right is about 80 by 300 feet, where all the different woods of the United States are on exhibit.

To the left a room of the same size, are exhibited the Indian relics, totem poles, etc. In the "L", Indian relics from all over North America, also dressed in their native costumes.

On the second floor, in the central room are mounted animals, mostly of the larger varieties, to the right mounted skeletons of animals, some extinct, mounted animals, mounted mammals, artificial bugs, butterflies, extinct animals, etc.

To the left, relics of Indians, prehistoric man, and the presentage, too numerous to mention. In the "L" room are mounted birds of every description, from all over the world, looking life-like and life-size.

The third floor being similar to the two lower floors, I will omit describing them, except the "L" where there is a beautiful exhibit of birds in their natural haunts, nesting and feeding their young.

All the exhibits, which are not too large, are in upright show cases, well arranged for inspection, but it would require a year to critically examine the entire museum exhibit. After making three visits, I feel as though only a small part of any one room was seen by me, and even then I came away each time mentally tired out, very well pleased to get away from all the wonderful things to be seen, and enjoyed the visits.
