In last week's Examiner we quoted an item from the Prineville Journal, which paper approves of Lake county's claim to a Representative in the next legislature. Crook county's sanction of our candidate makes almost sure his nomination and election. Klamath county has no candidate for Representative, leaving Lake and the two northern counties to supply the two to be elected. Klamath will get the Senator and is satisfied. Lake will get one Representative, and is satisfied. Crook is satisfied with this program, so far, and now Crook and Grant should get together on some good man from that end of the district for the other Representative. Mr. H. A. Brattain is well known all over the district that he needs no especial boosting or recommendation. He will not make a canvass of the district, as he simply permitted his friends to run him for the office. He is not an office seeker, and a great deal of pressure was brought to bear to induce him to submit to the wishes of the people in the matter of being a candidate. It was our pride and ambition when the rest of the district permitted us to have a candidate without opposition, to put the best possible material before our neighbors for their support; a man in whom every interest of the district could safely be trusted, and a man who we felt sure would make good in every way. We are not ashamed to ask support for Mr. Brattain.

The Silver Lake Oregonian evidently has at last realized that its jig is up. However, this fact has been plain, to those who can see things, for several months. That paper is now pulling its last string and would have the county seat moved to Paisley. Of course Paisley would need a paper, and the Oregonian being out of commission, would be an aspirant. This is a vain hope of our up county contemporary, but a drowning man will cling to a straw, they say, and it would only be a straw, if this editor's fondest hopes were realized, as his reign would be of even shorter duration in Paisley than it has been where he now holds forth. A great many of Paisley's people already know this heteroprosopus—whatever that means—and his crooked and lying disposition.
