

FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

Frying Mitts.
Don't put croquettes in lard until a blue smoke rises from it to show it is absolutely boiling. Too low a temperature means greasy, indigestible frying.
Don't attempt to fry anything until the lard is first tested on a piece of stale bread. If it turns a clear golden brown at once you are safe in beginning.
Don't forget to clarify and strain your fat after it has been used and save it for the next time. Only a wasteful cook throws away her frying material after it has done duty but once.
Don't forget to have heavy brown paper in a colander on top of the range, and put your fried things into it as soon as done. The paper absorbs any superfluous grease.

Cleaning Windows.
For cleaning windows some people use ammonia in the proportion of one tablespoonful to a gallon of water, but the work can be performed quite as efficiently and much more quickly by using clean water and two good chamomile leathers, one for washing the glass and the other for polishing it. See that the wash leathers are quite clean, and do not make the glass so wet that the water drips from it. Have plenty of clean water and change it frequently. Dip the chamomils in this and rub the panes, taking care that the corners are not forgotten. Wring the cloth tightly and go over the surface of the glass a second time. Then polish with the other wash leather.

Emergency Reliefs.
When a child is seized with convulsions, that most dreaded of infantile diseases, carry it immediately into the open air and the convulsion may soon cease. If the weather be cold be sure to keep the body well covered, but give the air free access to head and face.
Croup, which so often attacks children in winter, is caused, nine times out of ten, by the impure air in the house. Open the windows and admit plenty of fresh air, and you will find the breathing relieved and in most cases the services of a physician not needed.

Clothesline Holder.
A simple, but nevertheless practical, clothesline holder, which is a decided improvement on the common hook usually attached to the fence to support the clothesline, is shown herewith. With the ordinary hook the rope must be tied to prevent slipping when the clothes are on the line, the weight forcing the rope off the hook. With this hook the greater the weight

the tighter the rope is held in the holder. The latter is in two sections. Pivoted to the bracket is a cam, which serves as the hook for the rope. The latter is caught in the hook and the end inserted in the opening between the hook and the bracket. Naturally the greater the pull on the rope the more firmly will the hook be forced against the bracket, preventing the rope from slipping out of position.

To Remove Tea Stains.
If you find boiling water poured through the stain does not remove it, try equal parts of chloride of lime and sal soda or baking soda—either one will answer the purpose—say two and a half tablespoonfuls of each dissolved in about three quarts of boiling water. Dip the stain into this solution and then wash in the usual way, using soft water. You will find that this will remove a stain of long standing or one that has been set by being washed in soapsuds. If you have washed an article and had the trimming fade and run, the above solution will remove all traces of it.

Glazed Potatoes.
Select medium sized sweet potatoes, boil until done, take out and cool and remove the skin. Have an egg beaten with a dash of salt and pepper, cut the potatoes in half lengthwise, dip in the egg, dust with granulated sugar, arrange in a generously buttered pan, put in oven and bake until brown. Serve hot.

Tea and Coffee Pots.
Never wash tea or coffee pots with water in which there is soap. When they become badly discolored fill with cold water in which is dissolved a tablespoonful of powdered borax, and heat slowly until the water boils. Rinse thoroughly with hot water and dry. Always dry on the back of range.

Ammonia For Silver.
A teaspoonful of household ammonia in warm suds will clean silver thoroughly and make it very brilliant. If the silver is chased use a small brush. Rinse in hot water and dry with a linen towel. Ammonia is also excellent for polishing glassware.
