The Reno Journal states that through the efforts of T. F. Dunnaway of the N. C. O. Ry., a large tract of land in the Amadee country will be put under irrigation and made available to settlers. There is said to be 80,000 acres of rich land in that valley, partly government land, which is open to location, and the remainder is now in private ownership, mostly in the hands of the railroad company. The opening up of this and other large bodies of agricultural land in northern California and Southeastern Oregon, will insure to the benefit of the first railroad to tap this section and either insure the early building of the Oregon Short Line surveyed through Lakeview last Summer, or the extension of the N. C. O., and its being broad-gauged to meet the demands of this rich and growing country.

#### Notice

Some boys or rather young men have been in the habit of destroying mail boxes and cranes, on Route 7622, between Lakeview and New Pine Creek Oregon. These persons are known by several men who live on said route. Under sections 1603 and 1606, 1611, this is a high crime, as follows:

Every person who willfully and maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box, pillar box, or other receptacle established by the POSTMASTER GENERAL for the safe deposit of matter for the mail or for delivery, shall for every such offence be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1000 or by imprisonment for not less than one year and not more than three.
