Rangers' Examination

Washington, March 21.—The United States Civil Service Commission has just announced that examination will be held for the position of ranger at the Supervisors' headquarters at every National Forest office on April 23 and 24. It is estimated that 700 more rangers will be required during the present fiscal year than were on duty last year. The examinations will be held in seventeen states and territories.

Oregon.—Eugene, Grants Pass, Heppner, John Day, Lakeview, Medford, Portland, Prineville, Roseburg, Sumpter, Wallawa.

Applicants can secure information on the examination from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the Forest Supervisor at any of the offices.

Those who wish to take the examination should ask for application form 1903, a copy of the "Use Book," and a copy of "Information regarding Employment on the National Forests."

Experience, a thorough knowledge of forest conditions, and a sound body, rather than book education, are the qualities sought in examining applicants who desire to become forest rangers. The man must have the ability, however, to make simple maps and write intelligent reports upon forest business connected with the position. A ranger must be able to take care of himself and his horses in regions remote from settlement and supplies. Necessary qualifications of applicants include the knowledge of trail building, construction of cabins, and the ability to ride, pack, and deal tactfully with all classes of people. They must also know something of the laws, surveying, estimating and scaling timber, logging, mining and the livestock business.

The applicant should be thoroughly familiar with the region of the country in which he seeks employment.

Personal equipment and horses for use in connection with duty of a ranger are furnished by rangers themselves, and not by the Forest Service.

Races Commence Thurs- day, July 2d

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days' racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d and ending July 7th, 1908. The sum of \$1500 will be distributed in purses, as follows:
FIRST DAY—JULY 2d.

1st Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ -mile dash.....\$150 00
2d Race— $\frac{3}{4}$ furlongs..... 175 00

SECOND DAY—JULY 3d

3d Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ heat..... 200 00
4th Race—6 furlongs..... 150 00

THIRD DAY—JULY 6th

5th Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash..... 175 00
6th Race—7 furlongs..... 175 00

FOURTH DAY—JULY 7th

7th Race— $\frac{1}{2}$ -mile heat..... 250 00
8th Race—1 mile and 94 feet..... 175 00

9th Race—Consolation or some other special..... 50 00

The reason for the mile and 94 feet race is that the track is one mile and 94 feet from wire to wire.

CONDITIONS

All of the above races are free-for-all, five to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than five by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.

Entries to close the evening before the race, at 7 o'clock, sharp. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association to govern all races. Entrance fees, ten per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to the second horse.

The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling. No money paid without a contest.
