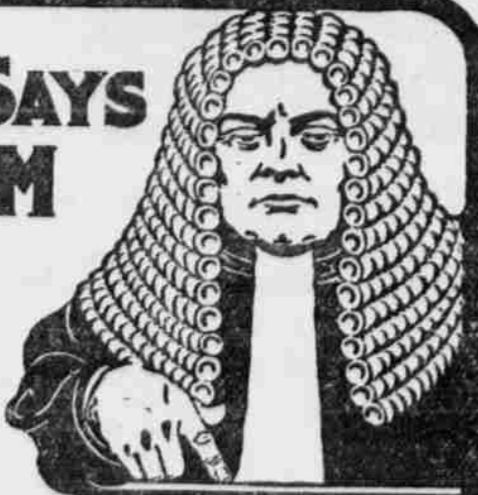

#### Increase Permits

Washington, March 20—The Forest Service has recommended that the number of cattle and horses allowed to graze upon the Blue Mountains National Forest in the State of Oregon, during the season 1908, be increased from 16,000 to 17,900 head and the number of sheep from 150,000 to 152,500 head. This forest has recently been divided into three administrative units, and the increase in the number of head of stock to graze on the range this year was made to permit an equitable adjustment among the former users of the forest.

#### To Exchange Lands

The forestry association, at a meeting held in Portland the 13th, initiated a movement for a state forest reserve. Resolutions were adopted proposing legislation by which the state shall be permitted to exchange about 100,000 acres of school lands located within forest reserves in scattered tracts to the national government for one compact body of the same area. The state land board and state forestry commission are directed to confer with the proper officials of the government and secure the enactment of legislation to bring about such transfer.
