County Court Proceedings

In the matter of the appointment of a Coroner: It is hereby ordered that Mr. William Wallace be and he is hereby appointed Coroner for Lake County, to fill the vacancy existing in that office.

In the matter of appointing a County Surveyor: It is hereby ordered that Mr. C. M. Faulkner be and he is hereby appointed County Surveyor for Lake County, to fill the vacancy existing in that office.

In the matter of the Petition of John Hayes, Walter Kittredge and others for the laying out and opening of a County Road in Road District No. 1. This Petition describes the proposed Road in part as follows: "thence West 40 Chains to the corner of Sections 9, 10, 15, and 16, T. 27, S., R. 14, E., W. M., thence North between Sections 9 and 16." This description is so faulty that it is a physical impossibility to run a line much less construct a road, running North between Sections 9 and 16 from the corner of Sections 9, 10, 15, and 16 as described in said petition; the road to run North would have to go between Sections 9 and 10 instead of 9 and 16. But inasmuch as the Place of Beginning and the Terminus of the proposed Road have been accurately given, the Court is of the opinion that the errors of description in the petition can be legally amended by the Viewers: It is, therefore, hereby ordered that the said petition be granted, and that the County Surveyor, C. M. Faulkner, with Martin Lauritzen, of Paisley, and Jack Partin, Jr., of Summer Lake, as viewers, be and they are hereby appointed to survey and view said road as provided by law; and that the said Surveyor and Viewers shall meet at Silver Lake on Monday May 25th, 1908, at 10, A. M. to survey and view the said proposed road as by law provided.

In the matter of the Petition of S. A. Lester, F. W. Payne and others, for the laying out and opening of a County Road in Road District No. 1. The description given of this proposed Road is so very faulty that the terminal point may be any place within one mile. The description of the proposed terminus is as follows: Thence West leaving the National Forest about the center of Section 5 Tp. 25, S., R. 12, E., of W. M., thence continued South West to the Klamath County line in Section 7 Tp. 25, S., R. 12 E. of W. M. The Court must, therefore, reject this petition.

In connection with this matter it might be well to state the fact that the Court has been Officially advised by the Road Supervisor of District No. 1 as well as from others residing in said District, that there is no public necessity for a County road along the line of the proposed route to the Klamath County line, for the reason that there is already a County Road established to that place, and when the same is suitably repaired it will furnish every convenience for all the people of said Road District.

In the matter of the petition of P. W. Reeder, J. S. Martin and others of Road District No. 1, for the laying out of a County Road along the route described in said petition: The Court being fully advised in the premises, and it being further Officially informed by the Road Supervisor of said Road District, that there is no public necessity for the construction of a County Road along the lines described in said petition. It is hereby ordered that the said petition be and the same is hereby disallowed.

Before the County Court can acquire jurisdiction in the matter of opening or laying out County Roads every essential requirement of the law, governing the laying out and opening of Roads, must first be complied with, for the reason that private property has to be appropriated for that purpose, and as it is one of the fundamental principles of law guaranteed by Article 5 as Amendatory of the Constitution of the United States, which provides, "that no person shall be deprived of property without due process of law."

Petitions, therefore, for the purpose of laying out and opening of public roads are so difficult to prepare, that the Court would suggest in all matters of this kind, that the services of a competent and experienced person be secured to prepare the necessary papers in order that the same may conform to the manifold requirements of the law governing such matters.
