The Farm Ice Crop. When packing into the icehouse take special pains to secure good drainage at the bottom, using rails and sawdust or some other plan to keep the contents about a foot above the surface, says American Cultivator. Lay the first course of ice on edge to assist further in drainage. Lay the other courses with rounded ice and fill ice and sawdust around the outside, packing tight. Cover the top with two feet of sawdust. Care should be taken to see that there is good circulation of air at the top of the icehouse. Almost any house will keep ice if drainage and air circulation are all right.

Selecting Breeding Hens. For breeding purposes select stock raised with some regard for nature's way. A scratching hen for breeding purposes is worth double a nonscratcher. A portion of our hens hang around waiting for something to turn up. Others are right out ready to scratch for bugs, gravel and green stuff, thus securing a variety of food and getting proper and natural exercise. It is better for all hands for the hen to rustle for a part of her food than for her owner to hustle and tussle for her. Carl Felmer in Farmers Advocate.

Artichokes For Hog Feeding. Artichokes are recommended for hog feeding by F. A. Eiford of Holmesville, Ont. He plants them the same as potatoes and roots, and the pigs harvest the crop, enough seed being left below the reach of the hogs for the next year's crop. He claims that 600 to 2,000 bushels should be grown per acre. The only cultivation given is to go over the land in the spring with a spring tooth cultivator, working the surface level.

Mulch of Snow. There is always something about a mulch of snow that farmers like to see. Not many of us know the material value of snow, but past experience has shown that it is a good thing to have on the ground, as it assures moisture and is more or less a protection to winter wheat and rye. It is regarded as the "poor man's fertilizer," to say nothing of its value in getting up the supply of wood for next summer.

Feeding the Horse. Horses vary greatly in the amount of feed they desire or require, but not much in the kind of feeds they like. All horses like good hay, oats, corn and an occasional bran mash, and barley is generally acceptable as a change. The grains mixed—say half oats and the other half corn or barley or both—are palatable, but how much to feed will soon be signified to the observing feeder by each horse.

Get Ready For Spring. There are many duties on the farm that are performed only during certain seasons, but an amount of preliminary work can be done in winter which will save time in the spring. Not a seed should be planted that has not been examined, and an overhauling of tools should not be overlooked. Get ready for spring in advance to avoid hurry and confusion during the planting season.
