Beginning at the South East Cor. of Township 11 South Range 22 East, Thence West to a point on the State line where the meander line of Goose Lake intersects the same, Thence North along the said line to the point where the Section line and continuation thereof between sections 9 and 10 Township 40 South Range 20 East intersects said meander line, Thence North along said Section line to the South West Cor. of the Corporate limits of the Town of Lakeview, Thence East along the South boundary of said Corporate limits to the South East boundary thereof, Thence North to the South West Cor. of Section 11 Township 39 South Range 20 East, Thence East to the North East Cor. of Section 13 Township 39 South Range 22 East, Thence South to the place of beginning.

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE COUNTY OF LAKE.
ORDER DECLARING RESULT OF ELECTION AND PROHIBITING THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS IN SILVER LAKE PRECINCT NO. 1, SUMMER LAKE PRECINCT NO. 2 AND PAISLEY PRECINCT NO. 3 OF LAKE COUNTY OREGON.

It appearing to the Satisfaction of the County Court that the question of prohibiting the sale of intoxicating Liquors was at a general election held on the first day of June, 1908, voted upon by all the voters of the subdivision of Lake County, Oregon, embraced in the three voting Precincts of said Lake County, Oregon, named, and known as Silver Lake Precinct No. 1, Summer Lake Precinct No. 2, and Paisley Precinct No. 3 in Lake County Oregon:

That thereafter, to wit, on the fifth day of June, 1908, the same being the fourth day after said election, E. N. Jaquish, County Clerk, and Winslow Bayley and W. B. Snider, Justices of the Peace for said Lake County, Oregon, did on said day at the County Clerk's Office, in the Town of Lakeview, Lake County, Oregon, then and there open the returns of said election and made an abstract of the vote cast for and against the sale of intoxicating Liquors as aforesaid within the territory embraced in the said three Precincts of Silver Lake No. 1, Summer Lake No. 2, and Paisley No. 3 in the said Lake County, Oregon:

That from the said abstract as returned by the said County Clerk and Justices of the Peace, it appears, and it is hereby declared, that a majority of all the votes cast in the said territory of Silver Lake Precinct No. 1, Summer Lake Precinct No. 2 and Paisley Precinct No. 3, of Lake County, Oregon were in favor of Prohibiting the sale of Intoxicating Liquors in said territory:

Therefore, it is hereby considered and ordered that the sale of Intoxicating Liquors be and the same are absolutely prohibited within the territory embraced in the said three Precincts of Silver Lake No. 1, Summer Lake No. 2 and Paisley No. 3 in Lake County, Oregon, and which Precincts are more particularly described as follows, to wit:

Silver Lake Precinct No. 1
Commencing at North East cor. of Lake County, thence West to North West Cor. of the County, thence South along the Western boundary of said County to the South West Cor. of Township 32 South Range 12 East, thence East to South East Cor. of Township 32 South Range 14 East, thence North to North West Cor. Township 31 South Range 15 East, thence East to South East Cor. of Township 30 South Range 15 East, thence North to the North East Cor. of Section 24 Township 29 South Range 15 East, thence East to Eastern boundary of Township 29 South Range 16 East, thence North to North East Cor. of same Township, thence East to the Eastern boundary of the County, thence North to the place of beginning.

Summer Lake Precinct No. 2
Commencing at South West Cor. of Township 32 South Range 15 East, Thence North to North West Cor. Township 31 South Range 15 East, Thence East to South East Cor. Township 30 South Range 15 East, Thence North to North East Cor. Section 24 Township 29 South Range 15 East, Thence East to the Eastern boundary of Township 29 South Range 16 East, thence North to North East Cor. of same Township and Range, Thence East to the Eastern boundary of the County, thence North to the place of beginning.

Paisley Precinct No. 33.
Commencing at North West Cor. of Township 33 South Range 16 East, Thence East to North East Cor. of Township 33 South Range 20 East, Thence South six miles, Thence West 5 miles thence south six miles thence West to Range line between Ranges 19 and 20 Thence South to South East Cor. of Section 12 Township 36 South Range 19 East, Thence West to North West Cor. of Section 16 same Township and Range, Thence South to South West Cor. of Section 33 in same Township and Range, Thence West to the West boundary of the County line, Thence North to the place of beginning.

This order to take effect and be in full force on and after the first day of July, 1908.

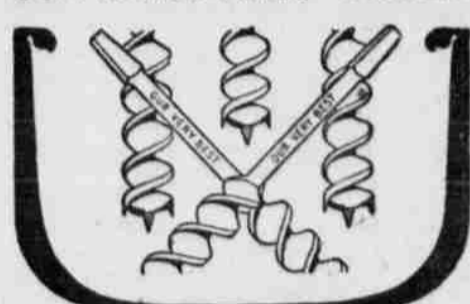
