### Sheep Sense

From time out of mind the innocent sheep has been regarded as an animal having no sense and while they have little human sense at the same time they have a whole lot of sheep sense which will put to shame our own knowledge when we try to match them with their own knowledge. To illustrate: The herder frequently gets lost in the fog, clouds, and timber, but I never knew of an instance where a band of sheep became lost, and many herders have had the experience of having the sheep take them to camp when they did not know where they were.

Again, take a band of sheep 100 miles over a strange country; and in ten years afterward take the band over the same route, and the remainder of the band left will notify the herder at each camping place. If it is in the evening they will let the herder know the place by bleating and show a contented home feeling.

Then compare three thousand ewes and lambs with the same number of human mothers with their young.

Every ewe in the band will, even if blind, any time after the birth of the lamb, will know her lamb from all the other lambs in the band by scent, and after a few days, both the ewe and lamb will recognize each other by the voice no matter how large the band of sheep.

A band of sheep is a better judge of the feed upon which they will thrive than any man living, and know better than most men how they should be herded. They know better than any man when they should be watered, and when they should have the range changed. The secret of keeping sheep fat upon the range is to allow them to herd themselves as much as possible, and letting them camp wherever slight overtake them if it is possible to do so.

Several years ago one of my neighbors came to me and said he had sold his cattle and purchased sheep and asked me to give him some pointers in the business. Wishing to impress him I said: "Sheep are never wrong when difficulties arise in their management." I explained to him when he went out upon the range and found the sheep not doing well, not herding easily, something was lacking. Either they needed salt, water, or needed to be changed to another range. It might be that the herder was herding them too closely, but, whatever the case might be, don't blame the sheep, for as soon as they

were thriving again they would be contented. Sheep are entitled to, and demand of you a full stomach if you expect them to prosper.

Should the sheep handle bad at the corrals, at the dipping vats, or shute, don't blame the sheep, as something is wrong with their arrangement. When the defect is cured, you will have no more trouble.

Several years afterward, when I had forgotten the foregoing conversation my neighbor approached me and exclaimed: "When I went into the sheep business you made what seemed at the time a rather strong statement, that sheep are never wrong," and added, that he had followed my advice and watched very closely, but he could not find a single exception to the statement made by myself.
