

CITIZENS WILL BUILD RAILROAD

The Central Oregon From
Shaniko to Prineville

LAKE COUNTY MIGHT DO SAME

This Move of a Long-Suffering

Public May Smoke Out
Harriman

Portland Telegram, 20, ult: Articles of incorporation of the Central Oregon Railroad Company, the object of which is to construct a railroad from Shaniko to Prineville and Bend, were filed in the office of the County Clerk this morning. The company is capitalized at \$50,000, which will be taken up to a considerable extent by the people of Crook County, who have practically decided to build their own road, because Harriman has done nothing.

The incorporators are Alfred F. Biles, F. S. Stanley, Jesse Stearns and Roscoe Howard. The route of the new road will follow the line on which Harriman promised to build a road when he took over the Columbia Southern. Hampered by the lack of an outlet for their immense resources, the people have tired of Harriman's delays, and as a result the Central Oregon Railroad Company was organized.

"This is not a scheme of speculation, nor is it a great railroad enterprise," said Jesse Stearns this morning. "It is simply a united effort on the part of the people of Central Oregon to secure an outlet for their products. Many of the farmers who have not the ready money will contribute grain and others will give work on the grading, so that the road may be built."

"While it is of vast importance to Central Oregon, it is also highly important to Portland, so important in fact that the people of Portland ought to help in every way possible to insure the construction of the road. It will give a direct route by rail for the shipment of Central Oregon produce to the Portland market. In the mean time Harriman is apparently trying to turn the trade of Central Oregon to San Francisco. He is building up from the south, and of course the trade will go with the railroad."

"In order that Oregon may have the full benefit of her own industries, it is necessary that the vast Central Oregon trade should come to Portland, instead of going to San Francisco."

Aside from the irrigation enterprises now under way in Central Oregon, there is a large volume of produce now grown in Central Oregon. Last year there was shipped from Shaniko 4,000,000 pounds of wool, to say nothing of wheat, other grain and timber. All this produce had to be hauled by teams to Shaniko from points as far as 150 miles in the interior.

Connecting with the O. R. & N. at Blazes, on the Columbia River, the Columbia Southern extends as far south as Shaniko.

From Shaniko to Prineville is 65 miles, and from Shaniko to Bend is about 90 miles. By constructing the Central Oregon road south from Shaniko the rich interior country will be provided with an outlet for its products, and will be given a great impetus in the way of further development.

It is the purpose of the organizers of the new company to push the work to completion with the utmost dispatch.

GOLD FROM HOAG MINES

A Big Mining Suit Now
On at Alturas

Alturas Placer, 26th: Mr. W. J. Grigsby of the Hoag mining district was a visitor at our office this week. He informs us that he has made a run of about six tons of ore to an assay and has made a clean up. The tailings are now being cyanided to determine the percentage of base ore, and the best mode of working the same. The yield from the six tons, Mr. Grigsby assures us, will be about \$100 per ton but, until the cyanided tailings are cleaned up the exact working yield cannot be determined. As he is an old miner and an expert assayer, he is satisfied his estimate is approximately correct.

Mr. Grigsby also informs us that in company with E. M. Jamison, another experienced miner, he is erecting a stamp mill with a cyanide plant attached, and the regular monthly gold shipments will hereafter be made.

Mr. Grigsby says the deepest working in his mine is about 50 feet, though he has about 100 feet of tunnel. The vein is a well defined contact ledge, and shows ore from \$10 to \$100 per ton.

The future outcome of the mines Mr. Grigsby says, is assured. Mr. Jamison recently sold his mine to a Portland company. It was a genuine spot cash sale, and while the terms are private, reached well up in the six figures.

The attention of the Superior Court this week has been occupied with the case of McCleary & Showers vs. Broadus, Dunbar & Shartel. The suit involves title to mining property in the Hoag district, and aside from being the first mining suit in Modoc county contains a significance far beyond the mere fact of a suit over mining property. The principals are men—men skilled in the business of mining—and are represented by an array of counsel and a score or more witnesses. If the mines of the Hoag district were worthless, as some contend, why are these men engaged in an expensive suit to determine ownership?

Messrs. McCleary & Showers are represented by N. A. Cornish and F. M. Jamison, while Broadus, et al., are represented by Bonner & Baldwin, Adams & Wylie and A. F. Shartel. About twenty witnesses on either side are in attendance.
