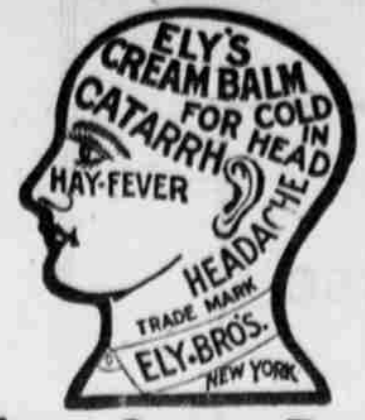

The SPORTING WORLD

Miles Seeks Lost Laurels.
The annual tournament for the amateur court tennis championship of the world will be held at the Racket and Tennis club in New York city. The games are to begin on April 6. Matches are to be best three out of five sets. According to the conditions, the holder of the championship does not have to play in the tournament, but shall defend his title if challenged by the winner of the tournament. Consequently J. The title will stand out until the end. This year's tournament is exciting more than passing interest, because Eustace H. Miles of London, former champion of Great Britain, is to try to regain his lost laurels.

Several months ago Gould announced that because of his college work he would be unable to defend the title which he wrested from Miles a year ago, but he has changed his mind. In coming here it is believed that the Englishman is prompted more by the desire to turn the tables on Gould than by any special longing to regain the title which he has held on so many occasions.

Frenchmen Take Up Bowling.
Paris has caught the bowling fever and so badly that in only ten months since the first alleys were laid in that city there are now a half dozen places where the teapin game has a patronage sufficient for a waiting list, the Frenchmen becoming as enthusiastic over the popular indoor pastime as those from the American colony who learned the game on this side.

The Bowling Club of France has been organized, with M. Barlatier, a director of Les Nouveaux Sports, as president and Captain P. L. Bowen, a former resident of Chicago, as vice president. Eight Frenchmen and only one American compose the committee of administration, an indication of French interest in the game. This club has for one of its objects the promotion of the game in other cities in France.

Plan a Basket Ball League.
So great has been the interest in basket ball in Indiana that a number of men interested in the sport are promoting a state professional league and hope to be in shape to launch it next season. They believe that by importing some of the crack players from the east and taking the best of the material available in Indiana they would be able to present contests that would appeal to the public almost as strongly as does roller polo in the winter or baseball in the summer. Many towns are mentioned for membership in the league, the list including Richmond, Muncie, Anderson, Indianapolis, Crawfordsville, Brazil, Columbus, Hartford City and Lafayette.

Terry McGovern to Play Ball.
Terry McGovern, once the champion lightweight fighter of the world, is now with the New York baseball team at Marlin Springs, Tex., at the invitation of Manager McGraw of the Giants, an old admirer. McGraw thinks, with Terry, that the former fighter can earn his living on the diamond. Terry is more than usually clever with a baseball and loves the game for itself. He will train with the Giants, and after he has reduced himself about twenty pounds he will seek an offer from some minor league club. Terry has trained with McGraw's men before and knows a lot about up to date baseball.

Burns' Brother to Take Up Fighting.
Urged by the growth of the roll belonging to his brother, Eddie Burns, who claims that relationship to Champion Tommy, has made his debut in the ring and has already secured dates for several matches. Young Burns believes that he possesses the same fighting ability as his brother, and he has started out in the 145 pound or welterweight class with the evident intention of making good. He is built on much the same lines as Tommy, and those who have seen him in training say that he gives every indication of developing into good material.
