THE VICE PRESIDENCY

It is a singular thing that for years the vice-presidential office was non persona grata to most aspiring politicians, not to mention statesmen.

Since Mr. Roosevelt, after repeated refusals, in the sleepy midnight hour, promised Hanna he would take the nomination, and through unforeseen and unexpected circumstances became the head of the nation and a most able and popular president, the importance of filling the place with an able and careful man has become more pronounced.

It is said that upwards of fifty prominent democrats were willing to be the running mate of Mr. Bryan, the choice of which fell upon Mr. Kern of Indiana.

It may be said of the present vice-presidential candidates that neither have occupied a commanding position in national affairs, although Sherman undoubtedly was the better known of the two.

In the event of the unforeseen happening, however, only strong, capable and honorable men should be called to the office of vice-president.

Massachusetts has an old age pension law. That state has just empowered the banks which are chartered under its law to enter upon the conduct of an annuity business on the weekly or monthly installment plan, which is available to the beneficiary at the age of 65 years, and carries a small death benefit if death shall occur before that time.

BUSINESS MEN HEDGING

An indication of how business men fear the results that would come from the election of Bryan is had in the fact that Lloyds, of London, England, the underwriting firm has accepted a new risk during the last few days.

The firm has been writing policies on the election of William J. Bryan. It has placed over \$500,000 worth in the Wall street district since the nomination. The rate is 10 per cent. Policies have been taken out mainly by brokers and financiers who are long on the market and anxious to hedge against a crash in stocks in the event of Bryan's election.

The only difference is that, in either event, Lloyds keeps the \$10,000 thus making the odds against Bryan 9 to 1.

At Grand Junction, Colo., on the 16th inst, Steve Adams, member of the Western Federation of Miners, was acquitted of the murder of Arthur Coillins Adams alleged confession of the crime was excluded as evidence by Judge Shackleton and eight witnesses testified to an alibi for the accused man.

Collins who was manager of the Smuggler Union mine at Telluride, Colo. was shot through a window of his office, November 19, 1902, when playing cards with friends.

It is thought that no trial on the other indictments will be undertaken, as it seems to be impossible to convict.

Our namesake down at the Golden Gate has discontinued the "A Matt" picture of the graft prosecutors in that city. It is high time! For, of all the disgraceful exhibitions in assistance of criminals, either high or low, ever indulged in by a newspaper, the San Francisco Examiner is the limit!

The decision of the Court in holding that Medford is exempt from the operation of the prohibition law, does not suit the "drys," and in consequence they are getting out a petition for a recall vote, the first time that this appeal to the voters has been invoked in Oregon.

The Death Valley Magazine, of Blythe, Nevada, is the latest. It is handsomely printed and contains valuable illustrations of desert life. It costs \$1 a year and is worth more than that to any one interested in the section in which it is published.

Judge Beuson held that prohibition must stand in Klamath Falls. The case has been carried to the supreme court of the state. It is evidently the purpose of the liquor interests to fight to the limit.
