HINDOOS CANNOT BE CITIZENS

The Hood River News-Letter publishes a letter from Hon. Andrew J. Balliet, Assistant U. S. Attorney at Seattle to the clerk of court, of Wasco county, Oregon, in which he says: This office is in receipt of a letter from the chief, division of naturalization, Department of Commerce and Labor, requesting this office to instruct clerks of court within the territory comprising the states of Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and Washington, not to receive declarations of intention to become citizens nor petitions for naturalization from Hindoos.

The News-Letter comments upon the above as follows: In viewing the records at the county clerk's office, another peculiar thing is noticed regarding the Hindoos. The naturalization books at that office show that the surnames of the fifteen Hindoos, who took out their first papers are the same, being "Singh," "Bhola Singh," "Eor Singh" and "Son Singh," etc. The foreigners could not speak sufficient English to explain the reason why their last names are all the same, though they stated that they were related in no way.

It will be remembered that while all of the Hindoos wore turbans for a head dress, one of the foreigners wore a white turban, the others wearing black or dark ones. Whenever any of the Hindoos of the black head dress were walking along the streets with their countrymen wearing a white turban, the former always walked a few feet behind the white topped Hindoos. Whenever he would stop they would do likewise, never going to his side or ahead of him.

BEST LANDS GOING FAST

The general Land Office has compiled its annual statement showing the area of the public domain remaining undisposed of July 1, 1908.

From this statement it appears that the Government still has an area of 754,533,296 acres of surveyed and unsurveyed land, including the following: Alaska, 386,029,509 acres; Arizona, 42,769,202; C. Florida, 29,872,497; Colorado, 23,636,637; Nevada, 611,770,501; Idaho, 26,785,092; Montana, 46,392,440; New Mexico, 44,777,906; Oregon, 16,85,791; Utah 36,578,998; Washington, 414,750,001; Wyoming, 31,457,302.

In Oregon there are 4,768,456 acres of unsurveyed land, Washington, 2,871,176 acres and Idaho, 19,476,044 acres. In Alaska all the land is unsurveyed.

Fire Loss Was 200,000,000

The types made us cut down timber loss from fires last week very materially. Instead of 2,000,000 feet loss, as stated, it was 200,000,000 feet, a very different account, and at lowest estimate of value, \$2.50 per M stumpage, loss foots up half a million dollars. Really the loss is much greater than the figures show, as there also was more or less young timber destroyed, which will take years to reproduce, if at all possible to re-forest the burned district.

GOLD BRICK FROM THE HOAG CAMP

A Fine \$400 One Can be Seen at the First National Bank, Lakeview

No one need say that there is no gold in the Hoag mining district near New Pine Creek, for there has been palpable evidence in town the past week that there is gold there.

The First National Bank of Lakeview has been custodian the past week of a gold brick produced from ore from the Soudsbien claim in that district. It will be worth from \$300 to \$400, when refined. It contains considerable silver, but when reduced to purity, the gold will probably be worth about \$12 to the ounce.

The brick is owned by Shner & Bassler, who are developing the property, and was taken practically from surface workings.

The product per ton was not stated in the letter accompanying the gold brick. We have seen it stated, however, that the ore is good for about \$100 per ton, and if so, that is good enough for anybody.

The brick is to be shipped from here to Schuer Bros., of Longmont, Colorado, who are interested in the mine. All this goes to show that Nevada hasn't all the gold and that a little of it stopped over in the making of it, into Oppulent Oregon.
