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COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

August 28, 1908. Court convened pursuant to adjournment of July 13 with officers present as follows: Hon. B. Daly, Judge; H. B. Heryford, Commissioner; Albert Dent, Sheriff; W. F. Paine, clerk, when the following proceedings were had to wit:

In the matter of the Road petition of John Hayes and Walter Kitteridge, et al.

This matter coming on to be heard at this time and it appearing to the Court that an order was made and entered on its 214. Volume 5 Record of County Commissioner proceedings on the first day of July, 1908, authorizing that said Road be opened according to Law, and that all papers therein be submitted to the District Attorney for his opinion as to their regularity and it appearing that the District Attorney on examination of the files therein, reports that no report of the Viewers, nor any map, nor profile had been filed therein, by the County Surveyor. That the Law is mandatory and requires the filing of said report, maps and profile so as to give this Court jurisdiction. That this Court had no jurisdiction at that time to make said order opening and laying out of said road. Now therefore said order made therein, authorizing said Road to be opened, is hereby declared to be null and void.

In the matter of the road petition of John Hayes and Walter Kitteridge, et al.

The report of John Partin, Martin Lauritzen, Viewers, and Thomas F. Curran, Deputy County Surveyor, heretofore appointed to view, survey and lay out the County Road petitioned for by John Hayes and Walter Kitteridge and 12 other free holders in Road District No. 1 of Lake County Oregon, being duly filed herein on the 25th day of August, 1908 said Report was duly and publicly read herein in open Court for the first time this 28th day of August, 1908.

Adjourned to August 29, 1908.

 In the matter of the Report of Thomas F. Curran Deputy County Surveyor, and John Partin and Martin Lauritzen Viewers heretofore appointed to view, survey, and lay out that certain road petitioned for by John Hayes, and Walter Kitteridge and twelve other free holders beginning at a point 65 feet East of the one fourth corner between Sections 22 and 23 in Township 28 South of Range 14 East of Willamette Meridian, and ending at the corner to Sections 9, 10, 15 and 16 in Township 24, South of Range 14 East of Willamette Meridian, and ending at the corner to Sections 9, 10, 15 and 16 in Township 24, South of Range

14 East of Willamette Meridian, being in Road District No 1 of Lake County, Oregon, which said report was duly filed herein on the 25th day of August, 1908 was publicly read in open Court for the second time this 28th day of Aug 1908.

And it appearing to the court that said Petition of John Hayes and Walter Kitteridge and others was duly signed by more than twelve free holders residing in the road district where said road is to be laid out and was duly filed for the consideration of this Court on the 4th day of March, 1908.

That the proof, that four notices, notifying all persons concerned that application would be made to the said court at their next Session for laying out said Road, were duly posted, and advertised for more than thirty days prior to the presentation of this Petition herein, has been duly filed here-

in. That the necessary and proper Bond with Chas Pitcher and Elmer D. Lutz as sureties that they shall, will and truly pay or cause to be paid all costs and expenses that may be incurred by reason of the view of said road in case the prayer of said Petitioners be not granted or allowed was duly filed herein. That owing to the great amount of public business the County Court was unable to act upon said Petition at the March Term of said County Court and with other public business said petition was regularly continued to May term of County Court.

That at the May Term of Court, to-wit: On the 7th day of May, 1908, said Petition was regularly taken up and John Partin and Martin Lauritzen were duly appointed as Viewers who were to meet with the County Surveyor on the 25th day of May, 1908, and survey and lay out said road.

That said Viewers did meet with the County Surveyor by his deputy Thomas F. Curran on the 25th day of May, 1908, or within five days thereafter as therein provided by law, and survey and lay out said Road, which report of said County Surveyor and Viewers in due form was duly filed in this Court on the 25th day of August, 1908.

That said report was publicly read in open Court on two different days, to-wit: On the 28th day of August, 1908, and 29th day of August, 1908. That the said County Surveyor, Chas. M. Faulkner did on the 25th day of August, 1908, file the necessary maps, field notes and profile of said road as required by law. And it also appearing from said report on file herein, that the opening and laying out of said road is a public necessity; it is hereby ordered that the

report of John Partin and Martin Lauritzen as road Viewers and Chas. M. Faulkner County Surveyor, of Lake County, Ore. by his deputy, Thomas F. Curran in reference to the laying out and opening a County road in Road District No. 1, of Lake County, Ore. be and the same is hereby approved and it is further ordered that Geo. S. Parker, Road Supervisor of Road District No. 1 be and he is hereby directed to proceed at once to open said County Road for the use of the public, and that when said road shall have been duly opened that the same shall forever thereafter remain as a public highway.
