FINE NEW SEEDLESS GRAPES
Fruit that Is an Inch Long and Almost as Thick

Enormous Thompson's seedless grapes, larger in dimensions than ever before shown Reno, were displayed at the opening of the Nevada State Fair. Averaging three quarters of an inch in thickness and being nearly an inch in length, these grapes, which were grown by N. J. Gibson at St. Thomas, in Lincoln county, easily are assured of first place in the agricultural exhibit. Raisins made from the Gibson product are pronounced by experts from the university experimental station to excel in size, flavor and firmness any such product known.

Gibson, who is the leader of the St. Thomas Mormon settlement in Southern Lincoln county, near the Arizona line, planted forty three acres of these grapes a few years ago. The vines grow on what was a barren desert. This year the crop averaged twenty-two tons to the acre. Some clusters weighed four pounds.

SMALL-POX PREVALENT IN ADJOINING TOWNS
There have been cases of small pox over the line at Cedarville, Ore., and also in Harney County. So far there has been no outbreak in Lake county. The Cedarville Record says that another case of small pox is reported at the Indian camp, making two victims of that dreaded disease among the aborigines. Mattie, the mother of the girl attacked is the latest victim, but we learn that her case is of a mild form. Both patients are getting along nicely. It is now thought that the disease will be confined to the Indian camp, and while there are about 40 Indians quarantined, the camp containing the afflicted ones is a considerable distance from the others, and the afflicted ones are the ones at that camp, and they are able to take care of themselves. It is hoped that no more cases will occur.
