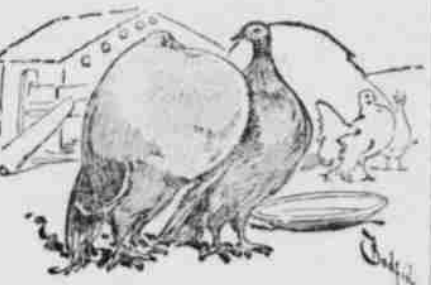
THE DEBUTANTE AT BRIDGE.
