RE-DISTRICTING THE STATE

A Portland exchange says Oregon legislators will once more face the Chinese puzzle of redistricting the state at the next session. At the last session an attempt was made in that direction but for various subterranean political reasons the senate representation was changed while the house remained the same, the bill for redistricting the representatives dying peacefully in the possession of Representative Jewell, chairman of the special committee to which it was referred.

At the coming session, however there will be a peculiar situation. Oregon now has 31 counties and provision is made for representation for but 33. Hood river county, created by the initiative at the election of last June is virtually without representation. It is true that N. J. Sinnott of The Dalles and Representative J. J. Carter of Hood River and H. C. Dodds of Dufur are entrusted with the joint duty of looking after the interests of both Wasco county and Hood river county, but they were elected as Wasco county representatives at the same time that the new county was created.

In order to provide for Hood River county's official representation it will be necessary to redistrict the state and it is expected that the task will be one of the session.

It is now stated that the real reason President Roosevelt is going to Africa is to study the negro question first hand in the endeavor to solve the question, now so palpably prominent in this country. Prominent men of both races acknowledge separation the only solution. But, how that is to be done other than by colonization is a question, and the magnitude of such a task is well-nigh unsurmountable. However, if any living man can solve the problem Roosevelt can, and it is a task of such huge dimensions that it would appeal strongly to him.

The office man who was sent by the Pittsburg Dispatch to report the Republican rally at Youngstown O., was much impressed with Governor Hughes, saying: "He added to his reputation another laurel, that of being one of the most magnetic and convincing platform speakers in the country has listened to since the era of Blaine, Conkling and McKinley. If the Republican national committee does not at once draft Governor Hughes for the 'war' it will close the door of a great opportunity.

An old time Linn County hunter, who has hunted deer since 1851, says that cougars are killing more deer than hunters. He estimates there are over 500 cougars in the state, and if each one kills and eats only one deer a week, it will mean a loss of 26,000 deer a year. If he is right in this a concentrated move should be made to exterminate these big cats.

Some one well and timely says that "the people of America are the playthings of the politicians." Politicians are the tools of bosses, and the bosses are the most valuable asset of the dishonest corporations. Bad politics bring on bad times. Thoughtless voters, dishonest leaders and scheming trusts breed panics.
