#### New Pine Creek

The Big Bonanza Group, the property of The Big 4 mining Co., Inc, has been let under a long term lease and bond to some Colorado mining men.

(From the Record)

The threshing of alfalfa seed will be completed in this valley in about two weeks more. It is roughly estimated that the yield will be 500,000 pounds. We understand that already two carloads of seed has been contracted for at 12 cents per pound, and it may be that the price may be increased a little later on.

It now appears that Alturas is the objective point of four or five railroads. Lakeview enjoyed that distinction for about 20 years and it is now up to the county seats to fight it out.

The quarantine has been taken off the Indian camp, and no new cases of smallpox have been reported.

Lakeview parties have contracted for 200,000 pounds of wheat from Lake City farmers. Parties from Alturas also contracted for a good deal of grain in this vicinity. Indications are that flour will be "legal tender" here before next spring.

### SOME DRY LAND PHILOSOPHY

Lake County Farmer and Stock Raiser—15 Years Experience

Mr. Editor:—When the grazing was free we could manage to live, now we have to pay in advance for grazing for what used to be the public domain. We have to pay it or stay out. Even the lumber has raised \$3. per thousand since the protection of timber. Even the firewood has raised in proportion. Even the farmer won't be allowed to kill a duck, snipe or a goose. But he has to farm to feed them, or herd them off. I believe we ought to have even charges with our grazing according to our stock. We encourage new-comers to settle the country but it would pay them to know the chances they have. Now the farmer can look back when they sold grain for 40 and 50 cents a hundred, while now we can hardly get it for 2 cents per pound, because they have demand for it, a great deal more than they can supply. But we have plenty of ground to raise more. All it needs is to farm the ground, and take chances with the rest. Industrious farmers can always live and always have to have some one to help them. If they don't have money they don't get any one to work for them, because we have to work for those who are able to pay us for the work, as the work would not be done unless paid for. What makes high wages, is three jobs to one man. What makes wages low is three men for one job. And if you save your money you might have a rest between jobs. I have paid for my experience.
