Hotel Accommodations In India. All over the world Indian hotels have a bad name to any one who has been used to a moderate degree of comfort and good feeding. Lightning and Thunder.

By counting the number of seconds in the interval between lightning and hunder it is possible to figure approximately how far from the observer is the scene of the storm. Sound travels 1,100 feet a second, so multiply the number of seconds by 1,100, which will give the distance in feet from the point where the lightning flashed. For example, if ten seconds have elapsed the distance away will be 11.000 feet, or a little over two miles. It might be added that, as light and lightning travel so much faster than sound, if one survives after hearing the crashing peal he can be sure he is safe. Remembrance of this will dissipate terror.
