

> Take four screw eyes, one-quarter or three-eighth inch. Screw two in the casing, one on each side of the window, at such a height that a line between will come up well toward the armpits when the woman is working on the line, and screw in the other two about of flexible cotton clothesline, put in an eyelet, or what sailors call a "thimble." at one end and secure the other against raveling either in sailor fashion or by whipping with a piece of twine. Then pass this latter end through the lower left screw eye, cross the line diagonally to the top screw eye on the right, over horizontally to the one on the left side, carrying it down diagonally to the lower screw eye on the right side. Pass the end through the thimble on the other end, haul the line taut and secure by a half hitch and simple running loop that can be easily opened, and the life preserver is in place and ready for work. It is strong and yields enough to the weight not to interfere with work and it makes it impossible for a woman to fall through the window.
