REDUCED PRICE OF HAY SO THAT FEEDERS BUY

The Klamath Republican says some of the large alfalfa growers in the Merrill country have made a reduction in the price of hay, which has resulted in several large sales during the past four years. F. M. Miller, of Lakeview, C. Swanston, Lewis Gerber and J. Frank Adams have purchased over 3000 tons of alfalfa hay. The average price paid was 87 a ton fed out.

There are still several thousand tons in the Merrill country, but as it is sold at a price which is considered too high, the beef feeders will not buy more than is absolutely necessary for immediate use. There are at present 1000 head of beef cattle that will be taken to Merrill alfalfa fields within the next 20 days.
