**UNLAWFUL FENCES MUST COME DOWN**

The stock companies which have been fencing government land will have to tear down their fences and allow homeseekers to file on the land. Recently the government has been active in Harney and Malheur counties and the predatory land interests have received their ultimatum as the result. The William Hanley company which bought the holdings of the French Glenn Livestock company has about 300,000 acres of land practically under one fence, which starts near Malheur Lake and ends in Catlin valley, a distance of sixty miles. Most of the land in Harney and Malheur valleys, besides a part of Steina mountain, is fenced. About 100,000 acres of this large tract is owned by the government. Several fine homesteads have been taken in these fields lately, which were formerly supposed to be owned by the stock company.

The Pacific Livestock company, which is the largest livestock company on the coast, also had large tracts fenced in Harney and Malheur counties. One field containing 40,000 acres, 15 miles south of Burns, has been found to contain several homesteads and have been taken in the past few months.

**SHIPPING SHEEP TO CHICAGO**

The Prineville Gazette, of the 24th ult says At Shaniko last Thursday morning a large shipment of mutton sheep to Chicago took place from the stockyards. A train of eighteen cars was loaded with the animals, the operation requiring the services of nine men from 6 to 12, at which time two big Southern Pacific tenwheelers hiked the train out of town. Three hundred sheep were loaded into each double decker, or 5000 to the entire train, and the freight tariff was \$210 per car, the rate to Chicago, or \$3750 for the trainload. John Fleming was the buyer, and it is reported that he paid more than \$3 a head for the mutton delivered at Shaniko, in the vicinity of which the sheep were grown.

**NOVEL INDUSTRY OVER IN KLAMATH**

The Klamath Falls Express of the 17 inst tells of the following novel undertaking:

One of the newest industries for Klamath county is a "minkery." Thus Staton, who has a homestead on the east side of the Upper lake near Battle snake Point, is going into the mink raising business on a large scale. He now has 40 or more of these fur-producing animals in captivity and says he will branch out more extensively as his facilities for handling them can be increased. Mr Staton says there is good money in breeding minks. They increase very rapidly and it costs very little to keep them.

They will live entirely on fish and as there is an abundance of suckers in the lake and it costs to get them is the time and trouble to catch them, the actual cost for keeping a large number of mink is slight. A large mink hide is worth from \$3 to \$5 and Mr. Staton will no doubt make a success of his new venture. He has a large string of traps strung along the lake and has purchased the Gregory launch to facilitate the work of looking after them.
