BEE CULTURE IS SUCCESSFUL

Klamath Man Has Demonstrated He can Produce Honey Bees

The raising and culture of bees will be one of the successful industries in this valley before many years, says the Merrill Record. Already Herman Katterson has a prosperous and healthy business in honey. He has about ninety hives of Italian black, and hybrid bees that ordinarily bring in a rich little harvest during the summer and fall. This year the crop of honey is short, owing to the early frost which was so disastrous to the potatoes and hay crop. Honey has sold at 12 1/2 per pound this year, leaving a good profit to the producer. Mr. Katterson devotes his entire attention to his bee culture and in a few years will have one of the best and most productive bee farms in the state.

L. A. Carriker, the successful dry land farmer of the West Side, was in town and reported only about a fourth of a crop harvested this year, as against those of previous years. He raised some wheat, barley and rye, all totaling 500 bushels, as against 2500 bushels last year. His hay crop was fair. He has not dug his potatoes yet, but believes he will have fair crop. The high price, however, prevailing will bring the income from the crop up to the usual average. Taking all things in consideration, he is very well pleased with the reward for his labor this year.

OREGON THE LAND OF SWEET POTATO

Russell Keizer has great Success with Product New in the West

The Salem Statesman asks: Can sweet potatoes be grown in Oregon? Down at the Board of Trade rooms are some specimens which were grown on the Keizer bottom four miles north of Salem, on the river road and which are as fine as any imported potatoes ever seen in Salem. Mr. Russell Keizer brought a bag of these potatoes to the Statesman office yesterday afternoon as proof of his assertion that they can be grown in Oregon to as good advantage as any other part of the globe. They were grown on sandy bottom land, of which there are thousands of acres in the Willamette valley. The potatoes are of large, uniform size for sweets, smooth, and cooked, are mealy and delicious for table use. Mr. Keizer purchased a few sweet potatoes from a Salem grocer about March 1, last, and planted them in a hot bed. About June 1 he reset the plants in the open ground and has a crop of something over a bushel, the yield being quite large. This test has been so satisfactory that Mr. Keizer expects to grow a considerable quantity each season and his example will no doubt be emulated by many farmers, if they do not go into the business on a commercial scale.

KLAMATH COUNTY HAS MULE RANCH

A Bly Rancher Raises Mules Much Sought After At Big Prices

The Merrill Record has the following to say of a profitable enterprise of Klamath county: John Wells, of Bly, is the proprietor of one of the finest droves of mules and breed mares in the state.
