MINES AND MINING

Alturas Plinadesler: M. R. Adams and W. R. Beal, mining men from Oakland, have spent a month in the Hoag district, and as evidence of their good opinion of the mines have made investments and will develop their property. Mr. Beal is a mining man of experience, having spent several years in South Africa and other sections of the globe. He is favorably impressed with the possibilities of the Hoag mines, but says as yet sufficient development work has not been done to determine the value of holdings. That rich mines exist on the mountains he is fully convinced, but it will require money and experienced miners to develop them. The gentlemen will return to develop their properties.

Alturas Plinadesler: Mr. Shauer, of the mining firm of Shauer, Bessler & Co., was a caller at our office this week. He brings encouraging reports from the mines, and is confident that a rich district will be developed. During the past four months his company has been running night and day shifts of miners, and is confident that he is nearing a rich re-charge. While here Mr. Shauer secured a five year lease on the Big Four and will begin development work at once. He says that at least half a dozen claims on the mountain, upon which development work has been pushed during the summer, are showing up well.

Alturas Plinadesler: Col. Hess has been developing a mine on Shauer mountain, midway between Adin and Sanby. He has sunk a shaft on a vein to a depth of 80 feet, the vein showing 5 feet in width at the bottom. A Redding assayer took two samples and they went \$44 and \$46 in gold and silver. Mr. Hess has pur-

chased a five stamp mill and has it on the ground and as soon as possible will begin the crushing of ore, several hundred tons of which are now on the dump. Mr. Hess has great faith in his mine. Though an old man and a cripple, he has displayed great energy and enterprise in the development of his mine, and we hope he will make a million.

The gold brick from the Bassler & Shauer property in the Hoag district, and which was on exhibition at the First National Bank of Lakeview, was sent to Washington, and gave a return of \$373.97.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST
