### ANA RIVER IRRIGATION WORK MOVING FORWARD

Mr. O'Brien of the Ana River Irrigation enterprise of Summer Lake, was in town Monday.

He reports that the construction work is now on in good shape. Camp buildings have been erected for man and beast. The site of the dam and other portions of the property have been cleared of sage brush. A canal has been dug to lead the water off from the dam site so as to enable them to excavate to the bed rock, in order to properly place the cement dam and head gates. All the work is being crowded forward as fast as possible, it being the intention to get the water on the land to be irrigated in the spring.

Mr. O'Brien says the river certainly is a wonder, gushing as it does out of the desert, with probably the largest flow of any river of its size, and length of only four miles, in the world, with neither enlargement nor curtailment of its flow at any season of the year.

## LAKEVIEW SCHOOL REPORT

The following is a report of the principal of the school for the month ending Nov. 6, 1908. Number of days taught 19; days attendance 4979; days absence 36; times tardy 60; number enrolled on register, boys 130; girls 150; total 288; average daily attendance 262; per cent of attendance 91; number of pupils neither tardy nor absent 159; number of visitors 4. The enrollment of the school is 28 more than for the corresponding month last year, and the average daily attendance is 30 greater.

Teachers are authorized to require excuses from parents or guardians of pupils either in person or by written note, in all cases of absences or tardiness or dismissal before the close of the school, and no excuse shall be valid except that of sickness or necessary employment. The teacher shall be the judge of the sufficiency of excuses.
