Flower Beds.**

The amateur who wishes to obtain
the greatest possible pleasure from the
flowers he can grow should study the
characteristics of each kind he chooses
and see that each serves a purpose.
Should he love fragrance he will find
Nicotiana glauca, with its abundant
star shaped white flowers, delightful
in its perfume on a summer's evening.
It is an excellent plant for a border
planted in front of taller growing
shrubs.

He should study color effects in lay-
ing out his flower beds. For a bed
where a mass of yellow is desired gold-
en California poppy is useful. It must
be sown where it is to bloom, as it
does not transplant well. For side
and back fences clumps of single and
double hollyhocks are good, planted in
masses. A flower which grows almost
as high as a hollyhock is Rudbeckia
Golden Glow, which produces a wealth
of golden flowers good for cutting.

In a back yard garden it is a good
plan to devote the space in front of
one fence to dahlias and cornus, for
these are sure to please the most fan-
tastic flower lover. If there happens
to be a sunny exposure in the garden
plant a few pompon chrysanthemums,
which are hardy. They will give an
excellent display of tiny flowers in the
autumn. The drummond phloxes are
exceedingly pretty low growing an-
nuals, very showy in mass. They last
but a few weeks in bloom in a warm
and exposed situation.

Of the dahlias the cactus and decora-
tive forms are becoming more and
more popular every year. They should
be planted, if possible, so their late
blossoms in August, September and
even later will help make the garden
bright after many other flowers have
ceased blooming.

The SPORTING WORLD**En Sue, Chinese Ball Player.**

Chinamen in this country have not
yet taken up the great American na-
tional game of baseball, but there is a
Celestial in Hawaii who threatens to
break into the doings in this country
very soon. This Chinaman is En Sue,
one of the greatest sprinters of the
present age. He has a record of 5.25
seconds for the fifty yard dash and is

reputed to be able to run 100 yards in
9.45 seconds. At present he is play-
ing third base for a team in Honolulu,
and his work in the field, with the bat
and on the bases is said to be marvel-
ous. He has played against several
American ball teams, and his ability
has been very highly spoken of. In an-
other year some enterprising manager
in the United States will probably im-
port him.

Taft Says Jap Can Defeat Gotch.

"I believe Hitachiyama, the Japanese
wrestler who recently visited the
White House, can defeat Frank Gotch,"
said Secretary of War Taft recently.
"Anyway, I don't think Gotch has a
right to consider that he has finished
the job until he has made my old
friend Hitachiyama cry 'Enough!' I
don't know whether it would be pos-
sible for the two men to agree on
terms," said the secretary. "Wrestling
in Japan is a very different matter
from wrestling in America. Instead of
being roped in on a mat, as they are
here, the Japanese wrestlers struggle
not only to throw each other, but to
push each other outside the marked
area. When a combatant steps over
the line with both feet he loses the
bout, just as he would if he had been
thrown on both shoulders."

Vigilant to Race Again.

The old America's cup defender Vig-
ilant will be put in commission this
summer and raced by C. Oliver Is-
ell. The famous yacht is now laid up
high and dry on the beach of Gard-
ner's bay, at Greenport, N. Y., but
work of uncovering her and fitting her
out will be begun shortly. She will be
put overboard the middle of May. Mr.
Isell bought the Vigilant last sum-
mer, but did not race her. She is elab-
orately furnished and therefore much
heavier than she was when she de-
feated Lord Dunraven's Valkyrie II. off
Sandy Hook in 1893, but she is still
fast and probably will be queen of the
coast this summer in windward work.
Though now rigged as a yawl, she re-
tains a large mainsail and has little
less power than a sloop of the same
size.
