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ELECT A REPUBLICAN

The Klamath Falls Daily Herald says that Lake and Klamath county each have a candidate for the governorship, in the persons of Judge Daly of Lake and Judge Noland of Klamath, as soon as Governor Chamberlain finds his way open to the United States senate, by the anticipated compliance of republican votes in the coming state legislature.

The fact of the matter is that the senatorial situation in Oregon is decidedly an anomalous, and reminds The Examiner very much of the story of the boy with an apple, munching away while his playmates were teasing for a bite, the apple meanwhile rapidly disappearing until only the core was left, and one little fellow wanted that: "Saw!" said the chap with the apple, "Dere haint going to be no core!"

Such is the condition with regard to the governor's aspirations for the Senate: "Dere haint going to be no core!" and his excellency will have to be content with what he has, although later in light of past experience either of our popular, able and amiable judges might aspire to the governorship, and win!

But, there is an ex-judge—well, of that more will be said later.

Now, as to the question as to who shall represent Oregon in the United States Senate, The Examiner is perfectly well aware that, under the operation of Statement No. 1 there was a majority vote cast for Gov. Chamberlain. It is true, too, in light of past elections where large majorities were rolled up for republican candidates, that republican votes alone made this man their choice for Senator. Why? Some assign one cause, and some another. It appears, however, in the primary elections, the present incumbent, Mr. Fulton, was defeated by Mr. Calk.

In making this suggestion of placing such a good, sound republican in the office to which the republican party of this state is clearly entitled, we act upon our own initiative and without consulting Judge Benson, or any one else.

The Examiner wants a republican to go to the senate and knows of no better man for that position than the Judge.

It is up to the legislature to act, and that, too, just as though there were no Statement No. 1 bugaboo in existence. A republican should be elected just as a democrat should be, were conditions reversed.

That is all there is to it!

But, after all that has been said and done with regard to Statement No. 1 it has no force, is not and could not be made mandatory under existing conditions, and there is neither a moral nor legal obligation upon the part of members of the legislature to assure it in any way. And less from a party standpoint is it wise or ex-

pedient for republicans to stultify themselves, or to bring reproach upon themselves, by voting for a democrat when there are men, good and true, honest, and well qualified, for the senatorship, within republican ranks. There is no need of it.

True, some republicans, either from pique, spite or some other cause, placed many of the members of the legislature in a position where they might be made to violate a pre-election promise. But that does not signify, and especially so, when making that promise they had no idea that they would be asked to elect a democrat in violation of all law and precedent!

The member of the legislature from this county is free to act in any way he sees fit. This county registered its vote against Statement No. 1. It would have none of it, and if other parts of the state had done as well, there would have been no such humiliating spectacle to the rest of the country as is now apparent in Oregon in the attempt to place a democrat in an office which by all sense of right and fairness belongs to the republican!

There is no question but that the republican majority in the legislature if so disposed, has a perfectly legal right to proceed to the election of a republican for senator. If the factional fight within the ranks is bitter, as it seems to be, in which one side is knitting the other, cut loose from both or all, and pick out some new man, some one with the necessary breadth of beam, and draught, and with guns big enough to make him self felt and heard in the national councils. Then, go ahead and elect him. That is all there is to it. And later, when the time comes so that senators may be elected by the people, in a legal and constitutional way, if the republicans then desire to elect a democrat—well and good—but now there is no more excuse for it, than there is for each Statement No. 1 legislator to butt his head against the capitol wall or to go and jump into the Willamette river.

The Examiner man being a stranger here, does not know much about the public men of the state in the persons of Messrs. Fulton, or Calk or Lowell. It does know Harvey Scott, and knows he has brains for the place, but probably he has lots of enemies—newspaper men are always so favored—who would prevent his election. We also know a man over in Klamath, broad, brainy, and, which coupled with honesty of purpose and a pleasing personality, who would make an ideal senator. The legislature might try him. It could do lots worse than to bestow the toga upon him.

Chas. Horton, of Klamath Falls, has been in Lakeview and vicinity the past week, making purchases of cattle for feeding. He bought some of Chas. Eccleston, E. C. Thurston, W. R. Bernard, Geo. Wright and of Anderson & Warner, and a few cows of the T. T. Company. In all he secured about 350 head.

Mr. Horton is engaged in buying and feeding cattle for the San Francisco market, keeping on hand 700 or more head all the time.

On Thursday morning Dick Wilcox, of the First National Bank got a wire from Boston to buy all the wool and mutton offered. While V. L. Snowling received word that the wool class of E. J. Flock, W. R. Konstan, Dick O'Mahony and others had been sold some place for 18c. This is one of the satisfactory results of Taft's sheep and one for which all the sheep men voted for in Lake county.

C. Swanson, of Sacramento, purchased 300 head of cattle from Geo. M. Jones of Paisley.

The Dalton ranch, near Bonanza has disposed of nearly 1000 head of cattle this season, and there is still a bunch left on hand.
