Appeals for the Seventh Circuit, which held it unnecessary for her personally to inspect a tract of public land before making timber and stone entry thereon. She declares in her petition that Garfield declines to follow this ruling, claiming that he construes the law differently.

Cederville Record, 25th: We are informed that a party of Western Pacific railroad surveyors are now entering the valley from the lower end, coming across Swearinger Flat.
