World's Standing Timber

The approximate number of acres of available public forest lands in the leading countries of the world is:

Adding the forests of Brazil and other countries in South America, Australia and other countries of the world, Alaska and the private forests of the United States and of all countries, the total available exceeds 3,000,000,000 acres, or about one-fifth of an acre for every inhabitant of the world.

Japan with her 58,000,000 acres of forest land annually exports about \$1,250,000 worth of wood. Until recently Japanese students of forestry were educated abroad, while now they are schooled at home.

France and Germany together spend \$11,000,000 a year on their forests, but they get \$30,000,000 a year for their forest products in return.

The forest products of British India are valued annually at \$14,000,000, with a net annual revenue to the government of \$3,300,000. The Indian forest service is one of the most efficient in the world, as also

are the American, French and German services. "Free-use" privileges are extended to India's 390,000,000 people in the same manner as in the Philippines—New York Sun.
