## Growing Desert Apples

G. F. Arthur, of the West Side was a pleasant caller at the Examiner office last week. In conversation with the gentleman we learned that, while the stock business is what he is most interested in, unlike most stock men, who do not value the land of this section for any other purpose than grazing, he can see great possibilities in store from an agricultural and fruit growing standpoint. Last year he secured a bumper crop of all sorts of grain, as the rainfall that season was ample. This year he raised a good crop of rye, barley and wheat. The crops were as good as some sections devoted exclusively to grain growing produce on the average. But, of course it was a small crop for Goose Lake valley, being about 12 bushels of rye, 17 of wheat and 40 of barley. He is satisfied with his experience here that even in grain raising this section is the peer of any section in the United States. Mr. Arthur also believes in the potentialities of this valley as a fruit growing region, and with the faith within is the first man to attempt to grow fruit on the West Side, the sage brush portion of the valley, and which old timers repudiate as of no value, except for grazing. Two years ago he set out 300 apple trees of approved varieties, right on the desert. Everyone of the trees lived and is as thrifty looking as those of same age planted anywhere else in the country. Not a drop of water was used on them from the time they were set other than the natural rainfall of that section. The result will be that Mr. Arthur will have a commercial orchard in the course of two or three more years that will be worth more to him than all the rest of his sage brush holdings. If he can succeed in

this manner others can do the same. The Examiner is glad to learn this fact, as Mr. Arthur's land lies within the area of the holdings of the Oregon Valley Land Co., soon to be subdivided into 10 acre tracts and placed under irrigation for the future homes of thousands. The experience gained by Mr. Arthur, who has pioneered the way for them in the line of fruit growing, will be of immense value to all these prospective settlers. ### COUNTY ORCHARDS MUST BE SPRAYED

All farmers, or fruit growers in Lake county are hereby notified that under the state law it is imperative that all fruit trees should be sprayed. For that reason fruit growers must obtain proper appliances in order that such work can be done during the period previous to budding in the spring. It is known that two dangerous fungus growths already have found lodgement in the county. Spraying will destroy all insects and fungus growth.
