TIMBERMAN WINS OVER HOMESTEADER

The Commissioner of the General Land Office, December 11, 1908, rendered a decision in the case of Thomas E. Murphy vs. George S. Harper, which, if upheld by the Secretary of the Interior, will have a very decided bearing on a number of other entries in this land district.

At the hearing it was virtually conceded that the homestead applicant had made good so far as was possible for him to have done so at that time, both as to residence and improvement, the main contention being that the land was more valuable for its timber than for any other purpose.

After considering the testimony submitted at the hearing, the Commissioner reached the following conclusions: "No practical compliance with the requirements of the homestead law on this land is possible in the matter of cultivation, for the land is not even fit for grazing purposes."
